OUR FORMAT remains the same however, with this issue we are printing by a new medium in the hope that we can do a better job on the illustrations and the use of a little color to give you an all-around better journal. We have acquired a considerable amount of new equipment for this purpose and hope to be able to learn to operate it properly in short order for added versatility.

This issue marks a real milestone in that we have now completed the first rough year. In retrospect, I feel that it has been very successful, apart from the normal growing pains experienced by every new endeavor.

I would like to remind all of our readers that this is NOT a commercial publication: it is your journal, and it can only continue as long as we receive your help in the way of news, articles, stories, varieties, etc. Several of you have been most faithful in this respect but by far, the greater majority have been content to "Sit on their hands" and let "Joe" do it. I have an abiding faith that we can continue to turn out a credible journal and I have invested several hundred dollars in equipment for this purpose to back up my convictions.

This same complaint has been voiced by the editors of previous Egyptian newsletters and of course, it came as no shock or surprise to me when reams of copy failed to appear. However, from the many letters received in the past year, I know that you want it to continue. All of us may not be able to write erudite articles of a technical nature, but everyone can send in news; Wants and Offers show results, photos and diagrams of unusual varieties and short items of general interest in our area. We are not looking for manuscripts in the Arthur Miller or Himingway style. Simply put it down on paper so it can be read. We'll do the rest.

We are averaging about 20 pages per issue a far cry from the 4 or 5 we anticipated in the beginning. Accordingly costs are ahead of our original estimate. For this reason, beginning with renewal subscriptions and to new subscribers we find it necessary to increase our yearly rate to \$3.00. This isn't a money maker. It is intended only to cover the additional costs of paper and supplies. We hope this needed increase will not work a hardship on any of our readers . .

WHEN IT WAS ANNOUNCED that the Graf Zeppelin would make a special trip from Friederichshaven to the Holy Land, via Cairo, the Egyptian Postmaster General hurriedly authorized the emmission of two stamps that would simultaneously commemorate the visit and prepay postage on mail carried from Cairo by the great German Dirigible.

There was not sufficient time to design new adhesives for the occasion so the order called for the provisional overprinting of the then current "27 millieme", brown air mail vignette. One thousand sheets of these were sent to the Government Printing Office at Boulaq, with the requisition that they be appropriately surcharged.

Half the quantity was to be for the 50 Millieme (post card rate) in blue and the other half for the 100 millieme (letter rate) in viclet. The words "Graf Zeppelin - April 1931" and the Arabic equivalent, together with the new figures of value and bars to obliterate the "27" were prescribed.

The entire overprinting plate of fifty subjects was hand-set from type fonts on hand at the Boulaq plant. As well may be expected, handsetting of a form like this resulted in the creation of several flaws, & the characteristics of which give the specialist an opportunity of plating the issue.

Though it is possible to differentiate between all fifty overprints, there are several flaws that are so striking that they have been recognized as minor varieties by leading general catalog chroniclers. They are as follows:

50 milliemes on the 27 milliemes. .

- A. "1951" instead of "1931"
- B. The Arabic "re" touches the Arabic "5"
- C. Large "N" in Zeppelin
- D. Large space between "5" and "0" of 50

100 milliemes on the 27 milliemes. . .

- A. Dot below first character of "1931" in Arabic portion of overprint.
- B. A large dot in front of the Arabic 100
  C. The bars obliterating the "27" are both badly bent.

This commemorative set was placed on sale only three weeks before the arrival of the Graf Zeppelin, at post offices in Cairo, Alexandria, Port Said and Suez.

The Graf arrived in Cairo on April 10, 1931 and after a short cruise over Egypt, left for Palestine with 747 cards and 1,711 letters destined for the Holy Land, Through some slip-up, none of these were delivered there, but returned to Cairo where an additional 4,046 cards and 5,908 letters were placed aboard for the return flight to Germany.

It is interesting to note that this is the first time, since 1879, that the Government Printing Office at Boulaq had anything to do with the postage stamps. In 1875 they were given the job of making the stamps but did such poor mess of it that future issues were ordered from England (First De La Rue and later, Harrison). In 1926 the Survey Department took over the assignment at Cairo and would undoubtedly done the overprinting of this issue, had they not been over rushed with orders for regular stamps.

This set is one of the most popular of all issued for the "Graf Zeppelin" and even at the present price level is still a fine buy for the wise collector.

#### CANCELLATION ERROR

#### ON SECOND AIRMAIL

(From W. F. BILLEN'S COLLECTION)

BILL BILLENS writes this month to tell us about an interesting cancellation on the 27 mill airmail (brown); (Scott No. C-2 and Xeheri No. 2, p. 230), that of SIDI GABER-CASH. This is Blomfield's Type Cas-11. As Bill points out, it is a very common cancel seemingly used over a very long time - span. He has examples from 1916 to 1932. But not to digress . . .

The instant cancel is "4 AP 29.3" which he translates to be April 4, 1929, 3.

The curiosity ? This particular airmail is supposed to have been issued July 17, 1929, a good three and a half months after this apparent usage !

"I do not believe this to be a forgery," says Bill. I suspest that a careless clerk in the post office set his handstamp to the wrong year (maybe as much as much as ten years later ? e.g. 4 AP 39)". "This might have been correct".

At any rate it is the kind of fun that anyone can chance upon at any time.

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## EGYPTIAN POST OFFICES

#### SAWAKIN AND WADI HALFA

By R. S. BLOMFIELD (P. S. E. 243, E. S. C. 15)

IN REPLY TO MR. PIPERNO'S REQUEST FOR further data on the above P. O.'s, below is a listing of what I have. There is probably some duplication of items listed in L'O.P., No. 90 and Mr. Piperno's holdings. I am not however, including the types prior to Type VIII.

<u>TYPE</u> <u>VIII-1</u> - Suakim: Charles Fox lists this spelling in Supplement (a) to his study of P. O.'s in the Red Sea area and the Sudan, in L'O.P., No. 40, pp. 445-454. But I do not recall ever seeing this spelling on VIII-1. It was used in Types IV-1 and IV-1.1.

<u>TYPE VIII-1</u> - Souakin: I have this on a 1 Pi. 1879, 20 pa. 1884, 3 mil. (maroon) 1892 (no time indication as "T1" shows, but there is a space after date, so it was probably inadvertantly omitted), and 1 Pi. Due of 1888.

<u>TYPE VIII-1.2</u> - Souakin: This is as illustrated in Mr. Piperno's article, Topics, No. 5, p. 82. The day, month and year are centered, and no time indication is included. I have never seen this type used by Souakin, but note the 3 mil. above, which might be mistaken for it.

#### IT'S AN IDEA?

In a recent letter, Dr. Peter Smith mentioned that our readers might like to see examples of album pages from prize winning exhibits.

Many of us exhibit on a fairly regular basis and many more would if a little more information was available. All of the shows are fun, large or small, and it is always a thrill to be able to pick up a trophy or a special ribbon.

We agree with Dr. Smith, and to start the ball rolling an example from the editor's collection, that has won several awards ih <u>TYPE IX-1.1</u> (5 bars) - Sawakin: This is illustrated on p. 450 of the Fox article mentioned above. He called it IX-2, but the numbering has since been revised. I have this on 1 Pi. 1884, 5 mil. 1888 & 3 mil. (orange) 1893.

<u>TYPE IX-5.1</u> (11 bars) - Sawakin: This is as shown in Mr. Piperno's article. Fox calls it IX-1 in the L'O.P. article referred to above. I have this on 1 Pi.of1884, 10 pa. Due of 1886, and the first Official of 1893.

<u>TYPE VIII-1</u> - Wadi-Halfa: I have this on 1 Pi. 1879, 20 pa. & 20/5 of 1884, & 1 Pi. Due of 1886.

<u>TYPE IX-3</u> (7 bars) - Wadi Halfa, (no hyphen). I have this on 2 Pi. 1893.

<u>TYPE</u> <u>TPO-4</u> - Challal/Wadi-Halfa: I have (3), 5 mil. 1888, 5 mil. Due 1888 & 2 Pi. Due of 1889.

<u>TYPE VIII-1.63</u> - Wadi-Halfa Camp: Wadi + Halfa is around the circle at top and Camp is horizontal below it. I have it on 3 mil. (orange) 1893.

1969 will appear in this issue. Dr. Smith has promised a copy of one of his pages for our next edition.

We would like to hear from you and if there is enough interest we will try to make it a regular feature.

We will, of course, need your help. Here is an opportunity for these of you who would like to be helpful but feel you just don't have the time, or the ability to put an article down on paper. 

In 1927, stamps especially designed for the consular service began to appear. They are of two basic kinds, which I shall call the "CREST" Issues and the "MOSQUE" Issues . . .

THE CREST ISSUES - Inscribed "Documentary Stamp for Consular Proceedings".

Type A - Inscribed "Kingdom of Egypt" 1927 - 1937 Watermarked: With Multiple Perf. 131 Crown and Arabic "F" 10m. red 200m. purple 20m. green 386m. brown 39m. deep gray 500m. green 50m. deep green brown & blue fl .£2 100m. mauve blue & brown Type B - Inscribed "Republic of Egypt" 1953 (?) Watermark and Perf. as above 39m. light green 500m. deep blue 200m. purple £1 brown & green 386m. brown (Others probably exist)

The "Crest" issues were printed by photogravure by the Survey Department in Cairo. Of Type A, I have three control blocks; 100m. -A/34, 386m. - A/37, and 500m. - B/27. Of Type C, I have eight control blocks: All are Control - A/60.



#### LATE USAGE OF AN

#### ITALIAN CANCELLATION

#### By W. F. BILLENS

"FIROSCAFI POSTALI ITALIANI". Here, if genuine, is a truly remarkable item . . .

This cancel is the Type 1.2, in Byam's "Interim report on the Italian Post in Egypt", published in L'ORIENT PHILATELIQUE (April -July 1960).

In this study, Byam gives the dates of the Italian Post Office in Egypt as March 1st., 1863 to its closing, February 1st., 1884.

This adhesive is the 1 Piastre (blue), Zeheri No. 34; which was issued December 15th, 1884 -- <u>ten months after the closing of the</u> Italian Post Office !

NOW TO SOME LOGIC !!!


This cancel is that of a Steamboat Service and it would seem possible that the steamboat service survived the closing of the Italian Post Office in Egypt, though why they would continue to use this cancel would remain a mystery.

Dimensionally, the cancel is correct. Byam describes it thus:

"Type 1.2. PIROSCAFI POSTALI ITALIANI enclosed in a rectangular frame measuring 23. 75 mm. x 12.25 mm.: letters 2.25 mm. high for the first word and 2 mm. high for Postali and Italiani. Frequently used to obliterate stamps but usually seen elsewhere on the covers."





IN PACKETS OR ACCUMULATIONS of cheap stamps, one occasionaly comes across low values of the general purpose fiscal stamps of Egypt, of the type illustrated in Peter Feltus' article in L'Orient Philatelique, No. 116, page 552. Many of them are cancelled in pen or indellible pencil; these come from receipts. However, some are found with ordinary postal circular date stamps. Don't throw them away -- they probably played the role of postal tax stamps, and have a legitimate place in a collection of postage stamps !

There are three ways in which fiscal stamps may receive postal cancellation (barring the special case of the Salt Tax Stamps). Letters addressed to "Poste restante" (General Delivery) have for some years been subject to a tax in Egypt, to be paid by the recipient. A fiscal stamp is applied and cancelled at the post office for the purpose. The first cover shown here is an example; this letter was sent from Argentine in 1944, and the 5m. fiscal stamp was cancelled with the "CAIRO/DELIVERY" date stamp. The 5 m. rate remained in effect until 1968. Mr. Eid, of the P.S. of E. writes me, at which time the rate rose to 10m. along with the general doubling of fiscal fees at that time. I do not know the date when this type of tax was first introduced, but I suspect that it was during World War II.

The second circumstance of postal cancellation of fiscal stamps is a result of a tax on parcels. In Egypt, as in many countries, postage stamps for franking parcels are placed on a separate parcel - despatch card, which accompanies the parcel (attached to it) but is eventually retained by the post office of delivery in many countries. This is the source of government "kiloware" commercial mixtures. A tax is levied on each parcel in Egypt, and is paid at the time of despatch by fiscal stamps, which are affixed to the despatch card and cancelled with the postal cancellation. The illustrated example if from a parcel sent to Massachusetts in 1954, franked with 275 m. for postage and bearing 3m. for tax, paid by fiscal stamps cancelled "ALEXANDRIA/ PARCELS DES-PATCHED" in exactly the same way as the postage stamps. I do not know when this tax was begun, but perhaps it, too, was a World War II measure. Presumably the rate is now higher

The last way for a postal cancellation is very rare, and only quasi-legal. During World War II, when there was a tremendous amount of military activity in Egypt, Military post offices of all sorts were set up to serve the troops. Some were necessarily set up hurriedly, and many were far out in the desert at the fighting front. Supplying all these offices was understandably difficult at times, and postage stamps were sometimes not available. This did not matter for the bulk of the correspondence, which required no stamps if it was addressed to the soldier's home country. Stamps were only required when a letter was sent air mail; was registered, was addressed to a place in Egypt, or was addressed . to a foreign country, with respect to the soldier's country. One way of solving the problem of prepaying, postage on such letters when postage stamps were not cvailable was to use whatever reasonable substitute could be found, including stamps of other count-ries also fighting on the Egyptian front, and even Egyptian fiscal stamps. The third cover, illustrated here, was sent from a Field Post Office in 1943, from a British soldier (R.A.F.) to the United States. The normal overseas surface-mail rate was 22m.: This was covered by five 5 m. fiscal stamps, making a slight overpayment.

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### A NOTE ON THE 2 P.T. OF 1866 - BISECTED

#### By PETER A. S. SMITH

AT THE AUGUST 20TH SAIE of Eastland Stamp Auctions (Harper Woods, Michigan), a cover bearing a bisected 2 P.T. of 1866 was sold. This is, of course, a well known variety, and is listed in all of the major catalogs. Bisection was authorized officially for use in Cairo only, pending the arrival of the new issue of 1867, and was later extended to Alexandria (the bisect is rarer, used in Alexandria). The cover in question, however, was cancelled at neither of these towns. The catalog illustration is so reduced in size as to be virtually useless, but I was able to examine the actual cover.

The cancellation on the front appeared to be that of ZIFTA & MITG, but only the last letter was clear. The reverse of the cover bore the receiving mark of "Birket el Sab". The dates of use were correct (23 LUG 67 and 24 LUG 67, respectively). The cover was described as being signed by Diena, and there was indeed a pencilled signature near the stamp; although it closely resembled Diena's, it was scnewhat blurred. There was a waterstain on the cover in the region of the stamp, and the portion of the postmark that fell on the stamp itself was nearly illegible.

The cover was actually a wrapper, and contained no manuscript notations. It was of a pinkish-brown paper of a type quite untypical of that used at this period. There was only the one strike of the postmark of origin on the cover - the one cancelling the stamp - contrary to the usual practice of striking the cover away from the stamp as well as on it. The cover realized \$65.00, and was a great bargain, if genuine.

The reason for the foregoing detailed description is to aid in examining the two apparent alternatives; either the use of bisects extended to other towns, such as ZIFTA & MITG., or this cover is a fake. Several of the features described above are sufficiently unusual to invite suspicion, but none is conclusive. The postmarks themselves appear to be genuine, insofar as my limited opportunity for examination revealed. However, the easiest type of fakery would be to take a genuine cover within the correct dates, remove the original 1 P. T. stamp, and replace it with half of a 2 P.T. stamp. The water stain and the poor legibility of the cancellation on the bisect would be accounted for by such a procedure.

If the new owner of this cover happens to be a reader of TOPICS, I hope the will submit the cover to one of the major Expert Committees, and then advise us as to the verdict.

It would be important to put on record this hitherto unsuspected use of the bisect, if it is genuine.


