





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with the editor

EDSTMARKS

ANOTHER IMPORTANT ARTICLE FOR SERIOUS STUDENTS OF EGYPTIAN PHILATELY — PARTICULARLY INTERESTING IN VIEW OF THE CURRENT TREND TOWARD POSTAL HISTORY.

Sometime ago I was fortunate enough to acquire, after some difficult negotiations, two beautiful entires relating to the early Egyptian Postal History. The first is a wonderful entire letter, very neat, with the oval registration mark PER CONSIGNA, Type V of the Posta Europea, and the second, a beautiful cover with the — till lately unknown — postmark of the new "POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE" post office of "BENHA", applied uring the SECOND TRANSITION PERIOD of 1865, before the introduction of the First Issue — 1 January 1866.

I will share, in the following words, my finds with my fellow colleagues in Egyptian Philately. 1 - POSTA EUROPEA - "PER CONSIGNA"
THE OVAL POSTMARK - TYPE V -

The oval registration postmark PER CONSIGNA, Type V, was introduced in use at Alexandria in the early days of May 1863. We know of a combination entire letter with this handstamp mark in the already famous POSTA EUROPEA collection of G. KHOUZAM of Milnao, Italy. The entire was posted at the Italian Consulate Post Office: ALESSANDRIA D'EGITTO POSTE ITALIANE and was to be forwarded to TANTA (Lower Egypt). This entire bears the handstamp of the Italian Office, dated 20 MAG 63 IS, in four lines, at the upper left corner, and in the upper right corner, the oval registration mark PER CONSIGNA Type V, bearing in the center No. 1326. These two postmarks are struck on the face of the en-

tire with the same blue ink. It is strange that the handstamp No. VI, which ought to be struck on the face of the Alexandria POSTA EUROPIA office, to indicate the date of dispatching, isn't in evidence but missing, with the reasonable supposition that the operator for the two offices—the POSTA EUROPEA office of Alexandria, and the ITALIAN CONSULATE POST OFFICE, also in Alexandria was the same person at the same premises.

As for the CAIRO POSTA EUROPEA office, we know about three entires bearing the similar oval regostration PER CONSIGNA, Type V, in the collection of Col. J. R. Danson of London: an entire dated 13-5-64. The number of the postmark in the center is unknown to us.

On the following page we show the illustration as (Fig. 4.) of the newly discovered entire letter with this very rare cancellation. The entire let-

We have no information about the arrival mark of the POSTA EUROPEA, Tanta Office. We be g Mr. Khouzam to supply us with the reproduction of the back of his entire so we can reproduce it in L'OP for recording. In the meantime we illustrate above (Fig. 1.) the face of this remarkable entire*. The Khouzam collection also includes a cut piece with the oval registration mark PER CONSIGNA, Type V, bearing in the center, the number 3955, this number being the highest ever recorded. Unfortunately the piece does not give any indication about its date.

* This cover was illustrated on the front page of the magazine NOTIARIO DELLA ASSOCIAZI-ONE SANITARI ITALIANI FILATELISTI A.S.I.F., No. 11 of November 1867. ter was posted at the POSTA EUROPEA OFFICE of CAIRO to be forwarded to the POSTA EUROPEA office of MANSURA. In the upper left corner there is the POSTA EUROPEA post mark of CAIRO, Type VI, dated 30 GENN⁹ 64 and in the lower right corner there is the oval registration postmark PER CONSIGNA, Type V, with the number 0243 in its center, this being the lowest number recorded for that office. All these postmarks are struck in black on the face of the entire. On the back of this entire letter there is the oval POSTA EUROPEA, Type V, of MANSURA dated 30 GENN⁹ 64. the same as the departure date from Alexandria; postmark struck in black.




Fig. 2 - PER CONSIGNA CAIRO & ALEXANDRIA No. 1983 dated 30 LUGL 64, from the collection of G. Khouzam, Milano

THE SECOND TRANSITION PERIOD - were in use until the 14th of April 1865; We 15TH APRIL / 31 DECEMBER 1865 -THE POSTMARK - POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE - BENHA

When the new Egyptian Postal Administration took over the workings of the private enterprise POSTA EUROPEA - the Second of January 1865, it was decided to maintain the postal fees during the whole of 1865 and to continue the use of the date and other handstamps of POSTA EUROPEA until the new material, with the correct name POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE, could be ready.

From the perusal of several highly specialized collections of Egypt, and after checking, here in Egypt amd pverseas with the members of the EGYPT STUDY CIRCLE, it seems that:

1 - The datestamps of the POSTA EUROPEA A listing of these offices follow:

will call that period — 2nd January/ 14th April 1865 - the FIRST TRANSITION PERIOD.

2 — The new date and handstamps of the POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE were introduced as from the 15th of April 1865 and we shall call this period between - 15th April / 31 December 1865 - the SECOND TRANSITION PERIOD. We must remind our readers that the First Issue of adhesive postage stamps of Egypt went on sale from the 1st of January 1866 and that all of the postal fees for 1865 were noted by writing on the

The new datestamps were naturally supplied to the sixteen (16) offices handed over by the POSTA EUROPEA to the New Egyptian Postal Administra-




Fig. 4. — POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE — BENHA — 26 APR 65 2T Earliest date recorded — From I. Chaftar's collection . . .

Three Offices Also Opened Abroad In 1865:

23 - GEDDA - opened on 8 June 1865

24 - COSTANTINOPLE - on 13 June 1865

25 - SMIRNE - on 14 November 1865

Each of the Offices Abroad received the same material.

From these twenty-five (25) offices, Which theoretically have used the new handstamps of the Second Transition Period — we have unfortunately, very few traces.

Of the original sixteen Ex-POSTA EUROPEA Offices we have recorded only nine:

We have no record at all of the six offices added by the new Egyptian Postal Administration inside the country, and by the way we are still wondering how these offices worked during the FIRST TRANSITION PERIOD, not having either the date stamps of the POSTA EUROPEA or the new material of the POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE.

From the three offices opened abroad, only the Costantinopoli office has been recorded, that on 14 September 1865.

We have then, up to the writing of these lines, recorded 10 from the 25 offices which were working during 1865. We will be continually on the lookout and hope our chances are better in the future for unearthing the 15 missing offices.

It seems that little attention was given by phila-

telists to the cancellations of the POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE of 1865, and it is probably for this reason that they are so scarce. The philatelists gave more effort to gathering cancellations of the POSTA EUROPEA during the last days of their use — FIRST TRANSITION PERIOD — so relatively, they are more commonly met with. Perhaps too, the entires or covers bearing no postage stamps attracted less attention.

During the summer just passed, I meta well known dealer with several covers in stock from the Third Issue: those with the ordinary one piastre rate and two stampless covers, one with the duty fee 80 on the face, and another with the scarce, and till then, unknown POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE, BENHA — 1865. This particular dealer did not want to dispose of the lot, however, I succeeded in convincing him to let me have them.

The BENHA cover, which is illustrated (Fig. 4.) on the preceding page, is very fancy, very neat and attractive as a cover. It was posted at Benha and addressed to Sign. Manuk, Alessandria. On the face of the cover and at the lower left corner is struck in black, the POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE BENHA, dated 26 April 65, Type S.B. On the back of this cover is the arrival postmark of Alessandria with POSTE VICE REALI EGIZIANE ALESSANDRIA, dated 27 April 1865 Type S.B.**, 1-3, also struck in black.

I am glad to have been able to add the BENHA 1865 cancellation — 26 April 1865 — to the 10 others already recorded and I hope that every ardent collector will go through his collection and any other material available to him, from dealers stocks etc., and try to unearth philatelic material to back up or further our researches on the early days of the history of the inner workings of the EGYPTIAN NATIONAL POSTAL Administration.




Fig. 5 — "PER CONSEGNA CAIRO to MANSURA NO. 0243 dated and 30 GENN^Q 64 — the lowest known number for CAIRO.




CROYDON - CAPE TOWN - CROYDON

F/O A.E. CLOUSTON and MRS. BETTY KIRBY-GREEN in a Miles Hawk Speed Six achieved certain immortality when, on November 14, 1937, they rose into the morn—ing mists above London's Croydon airport bound for Cape Town, South Africa destined to set not one, but three new records for this fabled run through the heart of Africa. Only 21 hours elapsed time was logged from Croydon until they touched down at the Capetown Municipal Airport at Wingfield on November 16th at 6.57 P.M.

An additional record was established on the return trip logged at 2 days, 9 hours, and a record for the overall time "Croydon - Cape Town - Croydon", in only 5 days, 17 hours. A fantastic performance for the year 1937.

While our research has turned up little on Betty Kirby-Green, background information on Flying Officer Clouston is more readily available to us.

FLYING OFFICER A. E. CLOUSTON

A New Zealander born in 1908 at Matueka where he received his early education. Bitten by the flying bug early in his teens he began flight lessons in 1928 at the age of 20, earning his license in 1929 at New Zealand's Marlborough Aero Club. The following year he sailed for England, intending to enlist in the R.A.F. However, a lapse of some ten months occurred before he was accepted and to earn a living, and to stay close in the proximity of the aeroplanes he loved so much, he took a job as an aircraft factory apprentice.

Finally accepted by the R.A.F., he was posted to the Flight Training School at Grantha and 6 months later to 25 (Fighter) Squadron at Hawkinge.

The 25th was known as an innovative Squadron, and they were the first to do acrobatic flying, the machines tied together with ropes. Attaining the rank of Flight Commander he flew with his Squadron for three years during the Annual RAF Display at Hendon. He was posted to 24 (Communications Squadron) in 1935 based at Northolt. Leaving the RAF in 1935, he became a test pilot for the Air

Ministry receiving the A.F. C. for his work in this field.

His first real claim to public fame came in 1936 when, flying the same Miles Hawk machine destined in 1937 to break three separate records in his run to the "Cape", he entered the famous Schlesinger Air Race from Portsmouth Airport (in England) in competition with eight other machines flown by some of the finest pilots of that era. (An article on this race will be featured in a later issue of Egyptian Topics).

A borken piston forced Clouston to land at Khartoum and wait for spare parts. At this point he was one of the three contenders remaining. With repairs completed he again took off completing a run of another 2300 miles before a gas shortage at Mtoko forced him to land briefly. But Lady Luck was not to smile on him in 1936 as, re-fueled, he was found with his wrecked plane some 150 miles south of Salisbury, deep in Rhodesian Territory.

THE CLOUSTON / KIRBY - GREEN RECORD FLIGHT TO THE CAPE IN 1937 (Continued)

On the 1937 Record Run a very small mail was carried by Clouston and Mrs. Green. Ten covers on the first leg to the Cape, ten on the return leg and ten making the round trip, signed by the aviators are known.

A very small number of additional covers were also flown which were unsigned but the exact number is unknown as they were carried for a pioneer dealer of the day, Mr. A. Phillips, late of Newport Mon in England.

All covers carry a small adhesive etiquette but, in different colors — single legs on pale yellow-orange labels while those making the round trip were printed on light blue labels. Wording is the same on each, as follows:

London — Cape Town Record Flight by by F/O A. E. Clouston and Mrs. Kirby-Green

(Note the word "by" is incorrectly used twice, once after flight on line two and again at the beginning of line three).

Both covers illustrated carry the London departure markings of November 13, 1937 in black and the oval cachet of the Capetown Municipal Airport dated 16 Nov. 1937 in purple. The South African "Penny Ship", franking for the return trip, is cancelled with CAPETOWN / KAAPSTAD c.d.s. also dated 16 NOV. 1937 in black. It is backstamped at Newport Mon, 23 Nov. 1937.

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

Market Notes

THE JACKSON WINTER AUCTION Of June 24th featured a section on Egypt and the Middle East. Of this, Egypt comprised 60 lots, the property of several owners. While none of the material was of the "spectacular variety" it nevertheless, contained some interesting items and the prices realized were noteworthy.

A number of the Royal Imperforates were offered, with numbers from Lee's catalog of Royal Imperfs. A few years ago these usually brought from 10 to 20% of Lee's price, and of course, the common items still do but, in this sale the Farouk high values, 50 pi and 1 Pound went for \$58.00 and \$57.00 respectively and Nos. 177-188, the UPU set, sold for \$175.00. No. 135, 5 m. Fuad, a tete-beche pair with gutter realized \$42 on the floor. The high value airs C-49 & C-50 each went for \$15 accompanied by a normal single from the Palace collections.

To the credit of this Auction House, item #862, Lee's #212a, var. incorrectly described and the subject of Dr. Smith's authoratative article in our list issue, was withdrawn as soon after they learned of the error as possible. No. 210a, the 5m Farouk printed in the purple color of the 10m., VF, OG, unhinged sold for \$32.00, probably a bargain.

Only two entires were noted (illustrated above); the first, folded 1851 letter from the British P. O. in Alexandria, to Paris "par Bateau Anglais" (English boat) via Malta with disinfection lazarets, red Marseilles transit and Paris arrival cds as V-VF went for \$28. A similar cover (1852) to Marseilles with letter intact brought \$26.



In our last issue we ran the illustrations shown here of some unusual cancellations on French stamps issued for use in Egypt at the request of Mr. Ken Pierce, hoping someone might recognize them and offer an explanation. Happily, Mr. Ajax Jakes of Robson-Lowe's Burgermaster's Parlour, our favorite literary critic, takes pen in hand with some interesting observations.

Dear Editor,

As it is a matter of general concern I felt I might address this to Egyptian Topics rather than to Mr. Ken Pierce.

There is probably no mystery about his Port Said stamp being cancelled Paris (assuming it is Paris). I have a number of stamps with cancellations other than their country of origin and all those that are on cover have been sent to an address where forwarding was necessary. On being posted, they have been re-postmarked by a clerk probably working unenthuisiastically at full speed! In this way they have picked up a second postmark.

I suggest that Mr. Pierce, and others of your fraternity who have similar envelopes look for traces of another faint postmark applied in the country of origin.

In this case, there is an even more obvious solution. The design was common to most French possessions and the sender might have returned from Part Said (together with some stamps) and used them in Paris. A busy post-

al clerk is more likely to notice the <u>design</u> (then current in France) than the inscription.

I've done the same thing myself for the fun of it and, though generally I've been found out, I've gotten away with blue murder!

It is a big mistake to think that all post office workers Know the Rules; and even a greater mistake to assume that they apply them. Like most people, the P.O. sorter wants to get his job done so that he can get home early. To apply the rules means that he loses time and gets home later.

Item No. 3 might also have suffered a similar fate having been reported at a P. O. in the RUE VICTOR HUGO. (Was there one in Port Said?).

How you did it, I don't know, but surely illustrations 2 and 3 are reversed? (No. 1 is too indistinct to see).

No Ajax, No. 2 is at the bottom left with a clear DE NOH. No. 3 is in the middle with a fairly clear HUGO and, while No. 4 is not too clear either, PA--S can be made out. We illustrate them again above hoping for clearer results with this printing as the originals were not too sharp.

Mystery Flight Cover

England-Sudan - 1927

A MYSTERY BECAUSE because we are unable to determine by whom, and in what machine this cover was flown from England to Africa.


It was acquired by the editor for a small sum as simply another air item 'and tucked away with only a cursory examination.

Addressed to a "Major, presumably of the British Army at that time in Omdurman in the Sudan franked with 2-1/2 and 6 penny British stamps, its only noteworthy feature is an adhesive cachet BY AIR MAIL, boxed and printed in black on deep blue paper. Also the manuscript "AIR MAIL" in black at the top. But, closer examination indicates that the

date is MARCH 7, 1927. On the reverse it carries the single ring c.d.s. of the Shellal-Haifa No. 2 T.P.O. dated 16 MR 27; and herein lies our tale.

We all know that no regular flights were flown to Egypt or the Sudan in those early days. Some military flights did take place and Imperial ferried a number of De Havilland machines to Egypt in 1926 and 1927 for service on the run to Iraq. The City of Jerusalem made its delivery flight from Croydon to Cairo just prior to this date on February 23-27, 1927. Did another machine follow in two weeks time? Was it flown by the RAF?

Airpost Notes and News in its issue March 1931,



makes mention of a proposed flight from London to Kenya with dateline of March 1927, with the notation "attempt abandoned — rare cachet". Did some intrepid soul make the trip after all, without fanfare. It could not have been Gladstone as he was already in the Sudan by March 12th.

Can anyone among our readers help with some of the factual details? Your editor would be grateful.


