
GLADSTONE, William Ewart (1809-1898)

Gladstone was born December 29, 1809, in Liverpool, Merseyside, NW England. He studied at Oxford, and entered parliament in 1832 as a Conservative, working closely with Peel. From 1834 he held various junior posts, becoming President of the Board of Trade (1843-45). He was Chancellor of the Exchequer in Aberdeen's coalition (1852-55) and again under Palmerston (1859-66). In 1867 he became leader of the Liberal Party, and soon after served his first term as premier (1868-74). He disestablished and disendowed the Irish Church, and established a system of national



education (1870). He served three other terms as Prime Minister (1880-85, 1886, 1892-94) until his resignation in 1894 and succeeded in carrying out a scheme of parliamentary reform which went a long way towards universal male suffrage. In his last two ministries he introduced bills for Irish Home Rule, but both were defeated. He was also the author of Studies on Homer and the Homeric Age (1858) and in 1869 he published Juventus Mundi, The Gods and Men of the Heroic Age, the product of the two previous years parliamentary vacations.
