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### **Sur le Trône d'Egypte**


## **S. M. FAROUK 1<sup>er</sup>**

POUR la première fois depuis plus de vingt siècles, un Souverain égyptien monte sur le trône d'**Egypte** pour y présider aux destinées d'une **Egypte indépendante**.

Aussi la date du 29 Juillet 1937, à laquelle S.M. le Roi Farouk a prêté serment de fidélité à la Constitution et commencé à exercer la plénitude de ses droits, restera gravée dans les annales du pays.

Depuis l'avènement de Ptolémée XIV, dernier Pharaon couronné suivant les rites millénaires, l'Egypte avait vu sombrer son indépendance et son histoire n'avait plus été que celle d'un pays constamment disputé par de puissants Empires ou déchiré par des guerres de conquête.

L'avènement de la dynastie du Grand Mohamed Ali avait commencé au début du



XIX<sup>e</sup> siècle le redressement de l'Egypte. Il appartenait à ses successeurs de poursuivre son œuvre et à S.M. le Roi Farouk Ier de la couronner en réalisant l'indépendance absolue du pays.

On comprend la joie avec laquelle les Egyptiens ont célébré l'avènement de leur jeune Roi et aussi leur désir de prolonger pendant l'époque plus propice de la saison d'hiver les manifestations de leur loyalisme envers le Roi.

La cérémonie du Couronnement ne paraissant pas conforme à la tradition pure des Musulmans, malgré le désir exprimé par certains milieux égyptiens, il fallut renoncer, croyons-nous, à cette solennité.

Heureusement, S.M. le Roi Farouk lui-même a fourni à son peuple l'occasion recherchée en fixant au 11 Février 1938 la date de son mariage avec Mlle Farida Zulficar, fille de S.E. Youssef Zulficar Pacha.

Il n'est pas sans intérêt de relever ici avec quel plaisir, quel enthousiasme même parfois, la nouvelle des fiançailles du Souverain a été accueillie, non pas en Egypte (rien n'était plus naturel!) mais à l'étranger et surtout dans les pays d'Europe que S.M. le Roi a visités, en même temps que Mlle Zulficar d'ailleurs, au début de cette année. Sa simplicité, son affabilité, sa jeunesse aussi lui

avaient conquis d'emblée toutes les sympathies. Et sa popularité était doublée d'estime, car tous ceux qui ont eu l'occasion de l'approcher, de s'entretenir avec lui, n'ont pas été peu étonnés de trouver en lui une telle connaissance des hommes et des choses, un esprit aussi formé, une telle maturité.

Grand amateur d'objets d'art, S.M. Farouk Ier est aussi un numismate avisé et un connaisseur en bibelots anciens.

On sait en outre qu'il a hérité de feu le Roi Fouad, son Père, une des plus belles collections de timbres qui soient et qu'il y porte un vif intérêt, un intérêt que nous souhaitons constant car cette collection est de celles dont le monde égyptien de la philatélie peut être fier.

Pour les amateurs de timbres enfin, la date de l'investiture a coïncidé avec la parution d'une série, la première, à l'effigie de Sa Majesté, imprimée par le Survey Department, d'après une photo de M. Bertram Park, prise à Londres et inaugurant un nouveau style dans les timbres égyptiens.

Qu'on nous permette pour terminer d'exprimer un vœu: puisse pendant de longues et prospères années cette effigie du Roi Bien-Aimé orner les timbres du Royaume d'Egypte, puisse Farouk Ier longtemps régner sur ce pays.

# THE HOUSE of MOHAMMED ALI

**M**OHAMMED ALI (1805-1848). Born at Cavailla (Albania), 1769. Served in Turkish Army: fought against the French in 1801 when Sir Ralph Abercromby was victorious over them. At the age of 36 i.e. 1805 elected Pasha of Egypt. Assassination of the Mameluks 1811. In 1820, expedition to the Sudan by Ismail who was burnt to death : Khartoum founded 1822. In 1831, his son Ibrahim invaded Syria and laid siege to Acre: fought against and defeated the Turkish troops under Rashid Pacha but in 1847, following a conversation at Constantinople gave it back to the Turks. Built the palace at Alexandria; founded the first hospital, abdicated owing to failing reason 1848, and died in 1849. No stamps issued in his reign but he is commemorated on the 10 mills. of the Medical Congress. Buried in the Citadel, Cairo: the mosque erected to his memory and containing his tomb, embellished with alabaster from the Pyramids of Giza, with its magnificent needle-point minarets, figures

on the 50 mills. of the 1914 series. Had three sons Ibrahim, Toussoun and Ismail : succeeded by Pashalik.

(II) IBRAHIM, son of Mohammed Ali : ruled June-Nov. 1848: died in a suburb of Alexandria, Ibrahimia is called after him.

(III) ABBAS (1849-1854), son of Toussoun; not a great success and it is said to have been murdered at Benha.

(IV) SAID PASHA (1854-1863) fourth son of Mohamed Ali, built railways in the Delta: gave Lesseps the concession for building the Suez Canal: founded the Bulaq Museum: Port Said is called after him: died in 1863.

(V) ISMAIL (1863-1879), son of (II) Ibrahim Pasha, born in 1830: made Khedive May 14, 1867. Fostered many public works of the greatest value, railways, schools, agricultural banks, etc. Introduced postage


stamps into Egypt and acquired the «Posta Europea» 1865. The Suez Canal was completed in his reign. His financial arrangements went wrong and for various reasons it was thought better by the Porte to replace him. A whole series of Stamps with his portrait was issued in 1934 in connection with the P.U. Congress. The first three types of Egyptian stamps, that is the Pellas, Penasson and the first De La Rues were produced in his reign. He left Egypt, settling in Constantinople, dying in 1895. Ismailia was named after him, was succeeded by his son

(VI) MOHAMMED TEWFIK (1879-1892). During his reign Arabi Pasha rebelled: Alexandria was bombarded by British warships and Arabi was defeated at Tel el Kebir by the British Troops under Sir Garnet Wolseley, Sept. 13th, 1882; Arabi was exiled to

Ceylon. In 1883 the Mahdist rebellion broke out in the Sudan and Gordon was murdered at Khartoum, 26th January 1885. Tewfik Pasha died on 7th January 1892 at Helwan. Port Tewfik at Suez and Taufikia in the Sudan were called after him. Following the Arabi Pasha rebellion British influence in Egypt commenced and British troops remained at the Citadel and at Alexandria until June 1937. The Stamps in use during his reign were the small De la Rues and the change of currency to milliemes took place in 1888: this affected of course the Postage Dues also. He was succeeded by

(VII) ABBAS HILMI (1892-1914), on 7th January 1892: the firman was read on 14th April 1892. His powers were less wide than had been Tewfik's or Ismail's. The Sudan campaign took place in his reign, ending with the battle of Omdurman, 2nd Sept. 1898. Egypt progressed socially: there were agitations by the young Egyptian party and Britain's influence grew stronger. The opening of the Assuan Dam (1903) brought a large acreage formerly sterile under cultivation: a boom in 1906 was followed by a slump: on the outbreak of war in 1914, Abbas Hilmi retired to Constantinople and has never set foot in Egypt since. He now lives in Europe. He was succeeded by his uncle

(VIII) HUSSEIN KAMEL (1914-1917), son of Ismail who was given the title of Sultan, under the British government. He was much liked and respected and there was much grief at his death in 1917 at the age of 63. Only one stamp, the 2 mills. surcharged on 3 mills. S.G. 129, was new in reign.

(IX) AHMED FUAD, born 1868: succeeding as Sultan, was proclaimed King on 15th March 1922. An enlightened ruler. Egypt advanced still further along the road to equality with Western Standards. He contrived to hold the balance of power between the

various sections of his people, riots broke out and were quelled and there was sincere grief on his death in April 1936. A philatelist, he acquired the superb collection of Mr. MacKenzie Low, the finest collection of the stamps of Egypt of its day. During his reign there

were issued numerous commemoratives, the military seals and at least three portrait series. Is commemorated by Port Fouad, near Port Said, which he inaugurated on 21st December 1926. He was succeeded by his son

(X) FAROUK, born 1920, who took the oath of allegiance on 29th July 1937 on coming of age. On 26th August 1936, the ratification of the London Treaty by which Britain's power in Egypt was reduced to protecting the Suez Canal though her position in the Sudan was not affected.

A special series of stamps was issued to commemorate this event and on 29th July

1937 a new series of stamps bearing the portrait of the young King was commenced. His betrothal to Miss Sazi-Naz Zulficar, an Egyptian lady aged 16, was announced on 23rd August 1937: she was given the Egyptian name of Farida ("Unique").

It will be seen from the attached genealogical table that King Farouk is of the same generation as Abbas Hilmi, though 45 years his junior, King Fuad being a younger brother of Tewfik and Hussein and 51 years of age at the date of his son's birth.

The dynasty has thus been in power for 126 years.

Comme je l'avais promis avant de partir d'Egypte, je vais essayer de retracer à l'intention des membres du Club, ce que j'ai vu et ce que j'ai fait durant la Pexip du 18 au 27 juin dernier en m'excusant d'avancer des erreurs ou omissions que j'aurai pu faire.

Pendant toute la durée de la Pexip les visiteurs se sont succédés sans interruption dans les vastes galeries du Grand Palais pour admirer les beautés de tous les pays qui y étaient exposées et pour avoir le bloc spécial émis à cette occasion; la photographie ci-dessous prise par moi-même l'avant dernier jour, dit suffisamment le succès de ce bloc spécial; la presse philatélique en a d'ailleurs longuement parlé.

ticipations se rapportant à l'Egypte ou contenant quelques documents sur l'Egypte. A noter que les deux seules collections d'Egypte exposées, appartenaient à des membres du C.P.E. et furent toutes deux primées, et que toutes les participations de membres du C.P.E. furent récompensées.

Je m'en voudrais cependant si je passais sous silence (bien que n'étant pas d'Egypte) la si belle et si fameuse collection de Grèce (émissions de Paris et d'Athènes, grande tête de Mercure) de notre membre d'Alexandrie, Mr. N. S. Alfieris. Cette collection qui ne contient que des exemplaires de tout premier choix, comprend entre autres pièces remarquables : verso de bande d'un essai avec dédicace du graveur Albert Barre; bloc de quatre, coin de feuille du 1 lepton de Paris; bloc de six, bord de feuille, du 10 lepta de Paris; bloc de 25, bord de feuille du 20 lepta avec sur la marge le nom de l'imprimeur « Ernest Meyer, Paris »; deux exemplaires du 10 lepta de Paris avec les deux chiffres du verso renversés, seules pièces connues à ce jour; 11 exemplaires du 20 lepta d'Athènes sans chiffres au verso, dont un sur lettre; étude des différentes étapes par lesquelles ont passé les chiffres du verso depuis leur début jusqu'à leur suppression (20 lepta d'Athènes); 40 lepta d'Athènes de 1871 rose carmin foncé au lieu de saumon, avec les chiffres du verso de la même couleur que le timbre; 20 lepta d'Athènes outremer de 1878 ayant les chiffres de contrôle au recto au lieu du verso, oblitéré Sparti 17.1.79, seule pièce connue; lettres entières avec affranchissements mixtes de Grèce et Autriche, Egypte,

Pour ma part je me limiterai à décrire aussi clairement que possible les diverses par-

France, Grande Bretagne, Italie, Lombardie, Roumanie, Russie, Sardaigne, etc.

J'ajouterais que cette collection, déjà primée dans bon nombre d'Expositions Internationales figurait dans la Classe d'Honneur et devait concourir pour le Grand Prix International de la Pexip, mais au dernier moment cette classe fut supprimée par le jury.

Durant les 10 jours qu'a duré la Pexip, j'ai eu l'occasion d'assister à divers Congrès et réunions philatéliques, notamment au Congrès de la Fédération des Sociétés Philatéliques Françaises et de la Fédération Internationale de Philatélie; j'ajouterais qu'à ce dernier congrès, le Président, Mr. Maingay, après m'avoir aimablement souhaité la bienvenue, a exprimé l'espoir de voir prochainement le C.P.E. adhérer à la Fédération Internationale de Philatélie. Le 22 juin le Conseil Municipal de la Ville de Paris reçut à l'Hôtel de Ville les congressistes philatélistes, j'y étais à un double titre: représentant du C.P.E. et d'une Société française l'A.C.E.P.

— Je me dois de dire que partout les différents comités tant de la Pexip que des Congrès me firent toujours l'accueil le plus sympathique.

Durant ces mêmes 10 jours j'ai eu l'occasion de rencontrer et de faire la connaissance de plusieurs membres du C.P.E. notamment M. N.S. Alfieris et le Dr. W. Byam qui m'ont longuement expliqué les «finesse» des pièces qu'ils exposaient m'a aidant à en mieux apprécier la valeur; Mr. L. Antokolsky qui m'a aimablement invité «for tea» chez lui et m'a fait voir sa collection générale fort intéressante, peut-être pas encore très riche en timbres d'Egypte mais certainement très avancée en colonies anglaises et françaises; le Dr. E. Diena, membre du jury de la Pexip, dont l'éloge n'est plus à faire, qui m'a annoncé une Exposition Philatélique Internationale à Rome en 1941, en même temps que l'Exposition Universelle qui s'y tiendra. A la Bourse Philatélique, annexe de la Pexip j'ai retrouvé deux sympathiques membres du C.P.E., MM. G. Cassinis et A. Choucri.

Avant d'aborder la description des collections exposées je tiens à mentionner que dans la Classe IX, « Littérature Philatélique » j'ai relevé avec plaisir les noms de deux actifs membres du C.P.E.: le Dr. M. Zirker de Haifa et M. G.N. Zéhéri qui exposaient respectivement un «Essais sur les anciens en-tiers postaux allemands» et un «Catalogue

des Timbres d'Egypte»; ces deux ouvrages ont d'ailleurs été récompensés par le jury.

J'ajouterais enfin que « l'Orient Philatélique » figurait également dans cette même classe où il obtint un diplôme.

Pour clôturer ces belles manifestations philatéliques, j'assisai au banquet du Palmarès à l'Aéro Club de France; ce fut une soirée très réussie et très gaie où je rencontrais encore une dernière fois les membres du C.P.E. déjà cités, sauf M. A. Choucri, parti pour Londres.

# A SHORT REVIEW of the POSTAL HISTORY OF THE SUDAN

by G. Seymour Thompson.

BEING scheduled to give several displays of Sudan during the coming winter I found it necessary to learn what I could of its postal history. I was stimulated by a statement in D.B. Armstrong's hand-book "Sudan" published in 1912—why does not that gifted author bring it up to date?—to the effect that prior to the evacuation of 1884 the Egyptian Government maintained an efficient postal system in the Sudan and that a postal system linking the various Government posts was established as early as 1874, to see what I could find out about it for myself. There must be many old gentlemen still living in the Sudan who were young men in 1874 but it has not been my privilege to know any such.

I was fortunate enough to find in a library a book entitled "Seven years in the Sudan" by Gessi Pasha. Romolo Gessi, an Italian, had met Gordon in the Crimea when he was engaged there on the settlement of a boundary question—Gordon, of course, was a surveyor and engineer—and the period covered by the diary is that from 1874-81, translated and published some time after his death. In 1874 Gessi left Cairo travelling via Suez, Jeddah and Suakin to Khartoum whence he proceeded to the Bahr el Ghazal in an endeavour to discover the source of the Nile.

Khartoum was at that time a large town of some 40,000 inhabitants, mostly native, with good streets, houses and shops in addition to the palace of fame. The principal European powers had consulates there: there were hospitals, doctors and religious institutions supplying nurses and no doubt a regular social regime amongst the European and literate classes.

Gessi makes several allusions to the postal system. The total government revenue was then only £60,000 per annum and the postal revenue could not have been great. There is no doubt official letters would be unstamped, and there was then hardly sufficient trade and development of enterprise to produce a considerable postal revenue. Egyptian stamps were used by the civilians and specimens of the period can be picked out of Egyptian lots with cancellations of Suakin, Khartoum, Ber-

ber and Wadi Halfa of the period. There was in 1874 a railway from a point north of Wadi Halfa to Kerma, since abandoned, but owing to internal disturbances, not only in the Sudan but in Cairo itself (Ismail's abdication and the insolvent state of Egypt at that time), government expenditure on public works must have been on a reduced scale. There were paddle steamers on the river carrying goods, passengers, and mails. Gessi mentions seven and Gordon lists thirteen, some of which he had armoured for his protection burning timber as fuel. The weight and bulk of this fuel must have been hampering. Camel trains were expensive and Armstrong mentions foot-runners carrying letters in cleft sticks.

Gessi mentions that when Gordon took up his administration in 1873 there was practically no coinage: soldiers were paid in slaves and cattle! The terrible state of the country at that time can be imagined. The country was divided into provinces, each under an Egyptian official who whilst under orders to suppress the slave-trade were the worst practitioners of it. Their salaries were in arrear (Gessi lost his arrears of pay), the officials exiled from Cairo lacked amusement and no doubt speculated in slaves and cattle to keep themselves going.

Gessi (p. 229) writes:—"My post from Khartoum is already 50 days late although it was confided to a very energetic person." Later: "At last, the post arrived to-day. It was a sack with a negro carried with difficulty containing the letters which had accumulated in the post-office at Khartoum and which had not been able to reach me in spite of the goodwill of the authorities."

Elsewhere he mentions a box as the container (see also D.B.A.): he also states that the post-office at Khartoum was as well managed as any could be. Signor Giordano was Director of Posts.

In 1881 Gessi Pasha, exhausted by a particularly arduous journey was rushed to Suez but died in hospital there. He had conducted a campaign against Suleiman Bey, the slave trader and put an end to him. Gordon, in

his diary, expresses the wish that he had men like Gessi round him.

We could speculate fruitlessly as to what the postal turn-over was at that time, but it is doubtful whether there were "offices" anywhere but at Khartoum, Suakin, Wadi Halfa and Berber to serve an area of nearly 1,000,000 square miles: much of the country was then unexplored and it is only since 1899 that the present postal system has developed. To-day there are, according to the 1935 report 97 offices including 3 seasonal and 18 T.P.O.'s. dealing with 16 million postal items and 313,000 air-mail letters.


In 1881 it serves Gordon retired and was given jobs in Palestine, Mauritius and Central Africa, returning to Khartoum in 1884 on his last mission: by that time the country was in a state bordering on chaos. The Mahdi was rampant and it is more than like of that, as Armstrong says, following his death the country was left to look after itself. Khartoum was partly ransacked and left to fall into disrepair. When Kitchener marched in in September 1898 it was a sleepy native town.

As Kitchener marched on ward, bringing up his railway from Wadi Halfa to Abu Hamed, he also brought up his stamps and obliterations. I have a Berber campaign cancellation (1897 issue) and a first day series of Camel Stamps with the Khartoum cancellation dated 11th September 1898. Cancellations of the first issue include besides Army Telegraphs and T.P.O. Abu Hamed, Wad Hamed, Halfa, Wadi Halfa, Wadi Halfa Camp, Korti, Kerma, Merawi, Dongola, Berber, possibly also Suakin, Debbeh, Argo, but I have not seen these.




Khartoum. S.P.S. II.IX.98: reputed earliest Khartoum cancellation following victory 2-4.IX.98.

blue (z 1589) a copy of which I have. Kitchener from Suakin kept up a correspondence with Gordon but as I have previously stated it is doubtful if the letters would be stamped.

The official "no value" label was not introduced into Egypt until 1892. The status of the interpostals of which Wadi Halfa "Barbar" Suakin, Dongola and Khartoum are still preserved no doubt served as franks for correspondence during the inter-regnum.

Gordon mentions a strike of postal employees for higher wages. Presumably they were not paid in wives or cattle, but Gordon

Coming to my own collection I have a 1 piastre pink (S.G. 76) used at Wadi Halfa 12 Oct. 84 TV and a 5 mils. Postage Due (S.G. D 11) used on the Shellal Halfa T.P.O. in 1889. There is no doubt that the railway above mentioned to Kerma was in operation at that time. I have several Suakin cancellations of which the dates are illegible in whole or part, but being November and December 9' points to 1896 when forces had already begun to concentrate there and the campaign was in progress.

My earliest cancellation on the 1897 issue is a Wadi Halfa of March 1897. I find the Camp cancellation as late as 1903 (Camel

type) and there was no doubt fear of local disturbance even then. There is an interesting cancellation "Sudan Postal Service" Halfa double circle (without date) on a block of 4 of the 3 milliemes, 1897 type, probably a pre-cancel. On cover I have a Berber which appears to have been 30 January 1898, although I believe Berber was not occupied until 14th April 1898. It is smeared and other of the same type is completely smeared as though to avoid disclosure of whereabouts to the enemy. There is another very large double circle cancellation, otherwise undistinguishable which may have been a "jury" obliterator pressed into service.

So far as concerns the overprinted postal stationery (1897 type) I have an Omdurman dated 1901. One newspaper stamp cancelled

very cleanly Wad Hamed 10x99 is of interest. Bennett Burleigh mentions this place as being near Darmali (i.e. near Atbara) and it was occupied 22nd August 1898 when Kitchener held a review there prior to marching to the Kerreri hills for the final coup de grâce. If there was a post-office there it must have been superseded by Atbara or Darmali itself now an extinct post-office, mentioned

and its obliteration illustrated in a previous number of L.O.P.

Comparison of various editions of the "Sudan Almanac" throws much interesting light on the constant revision of the postal service still going on. A number of the smaller offices are being engulfed by the T.P.O.'s and no doubt the Air-Mail will wipe out others, the following are noteworthy:—

GEILI: now Kerma-Port Sudan T.P.O.

KAWA: now White Nile T.P.O. and Halfa-Kerma T.P.O.

MELUT: now White Nile T.P.O. and Khartoum-Meshra T.P.O. uses KAKA.

No. 6 SUDAN: now Halfa-Khartoum T.P.O. No. 2.

TONGA: now White Nile T.P.O. and Khartoum-Meshra T.P.O. still a telephone post but appears to use Malakal.

TONJ: 99 mily road from Meshra, 78 from Kumbek no doubt served by T.P.O.

JEBEL MOYA: now Khartoum-El Obeid T.P.O.

REJAF: now Juba.

EL ODAYA: now En Nahud.

MONGALLA: now White Nile T.P.O.

MESHRA ER REQ: now served by T.P.O.

KODOK: closed 1936.

HAG ABDULLAH: now Khartoum-El Obeid T.P.O.

TAYIBA: now Khartoum-Sennar T.P.O.

GETEINA: now Khartoum-Meshra T.P.O.

JEBELEIN: now Khartoum-Meshra T.P.O.

Other offices once open, now closed include: GOZREGEB, KOSHA, MEFAZA, MUOLO, RABAK, SARRAS, TAIRARA, TAUFIKIA, ABU ZEBAD (1932), KAKKABIYA (1927-32), DARMALI, HILLETT ABBAS, MAKWAR, FASHODA (re-named KODOK).

The Egypt Study Circle is, I understand, studying the subject and I trust these notes will help rather than hinder it in its researches.

A comparative study of the annual reports issued by the Government of the Sudan reveals how the railways and air services are gradually spreading telephones and telegraphs everywhere, improved roads enabling long distances to be traversed by motor-vans and cycles and little by little this vast "back-garden" of Egypt is being retrieved from its backward state: So much in 40 years.

I have a set of Camel Type cancelled Khartoum, 11th September 1898 which I regard with some suspicion. I find the letters S.P.S. used on Wadi Halfa 16th June 1899.

How the S.P.S. differed in status or character from any other I know not, but the circular cancellation is on stamps with full gum and I suggest therefore a pre-cancel.

The railway from Wadi Halfa to Abu Hamed was begun on 15th May 1897 and reached its objective 230 miles away on 31st October 1897. No. 6 station (the wills) is 126 miles from Wadi Halfa. It is the only one of the 10 stations to have a postal cancellation. The line from Abu Hamed to Suakin and, later, Port Sudan goes through Haiya Junction, there the Khartoum line branches south and south-west and there is a big loop Haiya, Khartoum, Sennar, Geraref, Kassala, Haiya, Juba is the big air-port.

I have hand-obliterated 1897 stamps (Railhead and Mohammed), possibly Mohammed Goz.

A step has been taken towards instituting a modified system of self-government and it must be realised that our tenure is liable to revision as soon as Egypt decides to take over control, which might be in 1949 when we shall have completed our 50 years of condominium.

The stamps have been printed throughout by De La Rue & Co.: it is the local over-printing that has provided the principal philatelic interest in this country.

In 1899 the total revenue of the Sudan was £126.596; in 1935 £4,098.413. The Expenditure in 1899 was £230.238 (a deficit of £103.642) and in 1935 £3,993.113 (a surplus of £105.300). The peak year was 1929 when revenue was £6,981.590 and expenditure £6,610.274, due to expenditure on railways and capital received therefore.

The Postal Revenue for 1935 was £213.142. Cash revenue went up £33,000 largely owing

to heavy telegraph communication with Eritrea and to the proceeds of special issues of commemorative and air stamps, each of which brought in about £10,000 to the revenue. The total sales of stamps in 1935 were £49,467 as against £33,711 in 1934, telegrams increasing by £14,000. There was an increase in postal letters and parcels of 3,000,000 items and 61,000 air-mails. All telegraph communication with southern Sudan was by means of wireless, the old land-line being suspended between Malakal and Kongor. The number of telephone connections increased to 1798: Postal and Money Orders to the number of over 613,000 yielded £8,719. Savings Bank deposits increased by £14,000 to £102,540, the biggest increase since the service was instituted in 1913. A wireless service with Tanganyika and Kenya was opened on 1st June 1935. The military telegraph stamps have of course, long been superseded. Landings of Aircraft at Wadi Halfa totalled 566: there are 111 controlled landing grounds and 38 alighting reaches for foot-planes. In addition to the Imperial Airways service to the Cape the Italian Company Ala Littoria S.A. now has a service from Rome to Eritrea crossing Sudan territory.

Thus concludes this brief survey of the postal history as I have been able to piece it together from books, stamps and official records. I trust, not without some interest and profitable knowledge to my readers who may speculate and fill in the blanks for themselves. As we turn over the leaves of our album let us pause for a moment to think of those great path-funders: Gordon, Kitchener and Gessi, and of the thousands who have worked, suffered and died to bring the Sudan out of darkness into light.



Characteristics of the printing are:—

In no case does the character on the left (ya-5) overlap its neighbour (ra-4).

The length of the overprint is about  $7\frac{1}{2}$  millimetres, except on stamps 4, 45 and 53, where it is about 8 millimetres.

The varieties are slight; the most pronounced are:—

- (a) Gap between "meem" (2) and "ya"  
(3) just above the right-hand dot.  
Occurs on Stamps 10 and 26
- (b) Tip of the curved character ("ra-4") is blunt.  
Occurs on Stamps 12, 13, 25, 46,  
48, 54 and 68.
- (c) Curved character (ra-4) broken.  
Occurs on Stamp 62.
- (d) End of same character hooked.  
Occurs on Stamp 63.

## PRINTING "A.2".

I have seen the following value in this printing:—

50 milliemes. Block of 50 from bottom of sheet without control.

The characteristics are practically the same as detailed under Printing "A.1." The main difference is in the spacing of the overprint.

## PRINTING "B". [Fig. XX.]

I have seen the following values in this printing:—

1 millieme	Sheet with Control B.24.
2 milliemes	Block of 24.
3 "	Sheet with Control C.24
4 "	Sheet with Control C.23
5 "	Singles, only
15 "	Block of 20.

The characteristics are:—

The final character on the left (ya-5) overlaps its neighbour (ra-4) on every stamp in the upper half of the sheet, except in the first vertical row and on Stamp 32, where the tip of the curved character (ra-4) is missing.

On the lower half of the sheet and the whole of the first vertical row a vertical line touching the tips of the curved characters (ra-4) would clear the final characters (ya-5).

The length of the overprint is about 7 millimetres on most of the stamps of the upper half of the sheet and between  $7\frac{1}{2}$  and 8 millimetres on the lower half of the sheet and Stamps 1, 3, 11, 12, 18, 21, 24, 27, 31, 32, 35, 41 and 46. The long overprints on the stamps enumerated are due to wider spacing of the final or initial characters or to the use of an abnormally large final character (ya-5).

Figs. XIX, XX and XXI show blocks from identical positions in the sheets of Printings A.I., B and C.I., respectively. They represent

Nos 1 to 4, 11 to 14 and 21 to 24 on the sheets, and illustrate the differences between the three printings as described in the text.

The varieties are more pronounced than in Printing "A" and more interesting, as some of them link this printing with the next. They are:

- (a) Character on the left abnormally large (ya-5). Occurs on Stamps 3, 17, 18, 24 and 27. [Fig. XX.]
- (b) Tip of curved character (ra-4) is hooked. Occurs on Stamp 52.
- (c) End of curved character (ra-4) is missing. Occurs on Stamp 32.
- (d) Vertical character and small character above it (Alif and hamsa-1) are defective. Occurs on Stamp 75.
- (e) Bottom of vertical character (Alif-1) is level with its neighbour. Occurs on Stamps 33, 34, 44, 57 and 75.

#### PRINTING "C.1". [Fig. XXI.]

I have seen the following value in this printing:

10 milliemes. Sheet with Control C.24.

Its characteristics are:

A vertical line touching the tips of the curved characters (ra-4) would clear the final characters (ya-5) in every case except, perhaps, on Stamp 71.

The length of the overprint is from  $7\frac{3}{4}$  to 8 millimetres, except on Stamps 33, 34 and 85, where it is about  $7\frac{1}{2}$  millimetres, and on Stamps 57 and 71, where it is about 7 millimetres.

The varieties are as described under (a) (as far as concerns Stamp 3 only), (c), (d) and (e) of Printing "B".

It is a reasonable assumption that this printing is a correction of Printing "B", as:

- (i) The varieties occupy the same sheet position.
- (ii) The spacing has been regularised.
- (iii) Four out of the five large final characters (ya-5) of Printing "B" have been replaced; that on Stamp 3 was overlooked. [Fig. XXI.]

#### PRINTING "C.2".

I have seen the following value in this printing:

50 milliemes. Sheet with no control.

The characteristics are practically the same as detailed under "C.1". The main difference is in the spacing of the overprint.

**Values:** 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 10 and 15 millièmes.

**Characteristics:** Final character (ya-5) does not overlap its neighbour.

Overprint measures about  $7 \frac{1}{2}$  millimetres with three exceptions.

**Printing "A.2".**

**Values:** 50 millièmes, only.

**Characteristics:** As "A.1".

**Printing "B".**

**Values:** 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 15 millièmes.

**Characteristics:** Except in first vertical row the final character (ya-5) overlaps on the upper half of sheet. It does not overlap in first vertical row and lower half. Overprint measures about 7 millimetres on most of the upper half and about  $7 \frac{1}{2}$ -8 millimetres on most of the lower half of the sheet.

**Varieties:** Final character (ya-5) large on Stamps 3, 17, 18, 24 and 27.

**Printing "C.1".**

**Values:** 10 millièmes only.

**Characteristics:** Final character (ya-5) does not overlap its neighbour.

Overprint measures about  $7 \frac{3}{4}$ -8 millimetres in nearly all cases.

**Varieties:** Final character (ya-5) large.  
Stamp 3.

**Printing "C.2"**

**Values:** 50 millièmes, only.

**Characteristics and Varieties:** As "C.1".

**1926-34.** Specially designed stamps printed by the Survey Department, Cairo, by offset lithography.

**Values:** 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 10, 15, 20 and 50 millièmes.

The Survey Department was not responsible for the design.

There are no varieties the printing is uniform, and the design is strictly utilitarian.

The issue is included in this article to complete the series.

I wish to place on record my deep appreciation of the help received from that well-known dealer Mr. E.L. Angeloglou. This gentleman placed the whole of his immense stock at my disposal, and furthermore, was always ready to discuss any points and give me the benefit of his long experience. I think

he rather enjoyed being worried as he is very enthusiastic about the stamps of his adopted country.

I received very courteous treatment from the Egyptian postal officials generally, and Mr. Sayed Ahmed Ghalwash, Director of the International Service of the Egyptian Postal Administration, helped particularly by tracing the various Department Orders referred to in the introduction. I had almost given up hope in this connection until I met him.

# NOUVEAUTES DE L'ORIENT

## Egypte

Comme précédemment annoncé, la première partie de la série définitive à l'effigie du roi Farouk Ier a paru le 29 juillet 1937.

Dentelés  $13\frac{1}{2} \times 13\frac{1}{2}$  les timbres qui la composent sont les 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 10, 13, 15 et 20 mills., émis en feuille de 100 exemplaires, chiffres de contrôle A. 37.

Les couleurs sont les mêmes que la série précédente à l'effigie du roi Fouad, seul le 2 mills. de noir est devenu vermillon.

De l'avis général ces timbres sont « ratés » à plusieurs points de vue; voici rapidement les principaux points qu'on leur critique: le dessin, il aurait pu être très bien avec un portrait moins volumineux et sans les indicatifs de la valeur flanqués si lourdement et si gauchement de chaque côté de la tête si jeune du roi; la suppression de l'encadrement simplifie peut-être le travail de la perforation, mais enlève au timbre tout son relief en lui donnant un air inachevé, négligé; les couleurs, sont fades insipides et manquent de fermeté, il semble que la chaleur les ait anémierées avant même d'être livrées au public, que deviendront-elles dans quelques années? un souvenir, un rêve sans doute.

Ce premier échantillon d'une grande série définitive n'est pas tout à l'honneur du Survey Dept. qui nous avait habitués à beaucoup mieux.

C'est le 15 octobre 1937 que doit paraître la série spéciale commémorative de l'abrogation des capitulations. Composée de 3 valeurs, 5, 15 et 20 mills. cette série sera à un type unique et représentera une des faces

de la médaille souvenir qui fut remise aux délégués à la Conférence de Montreux, et sur laquelle on voit une paysanne égyptienne.

### PHILATELIC INSURANCE

Underwriters of Philatelic insurance are beginning to find the old rates did not pay. Last year they were badly let in and this year all rates on circulating packets are being increased to about sh. 7/6 d. o/o. In consequence our Club will be obliged to increase its insurance charges to members circulating to 1/4 % i.e. 1/2 d. in the £ with a minimum of 3d. which will just about cover it on a circulation of £800 per annum which we expect to reach.

Members in Great Britain desirous of insuring their collections may do so through the Eagle Star Insurance Coy. or through Lloyds by communicating with Mr. Thompson who will pass the business on without charge to the Club's Agent.

### CAUTION!!!

"In God we trust, all others cash" is a sound motto. Quite recently the C.P.E. agent in Great Britain has had to handle two claims against a small English dealer on behalf of two senders in Egypt and in each case the claim was fairly satisfactorily settled with very little expense. The person who "also sells" stamps is frequently a nuisance to the trade, tobacconists, newsvendors, toy-shops and the like; even amongst these there are good and bad but the most ordinary business prudence should prevent the giving of credit without preliminary enquiry—a banker's or a trade reference—which should be followed up, even if delay causes the deal to fall through. This particular dealer returned the stamps for which he had not paid, some of which had depreciated in value in six months and one or two were torn. The creditor in Cairo cannot sue in the English courts: he would have to obtain judgment in Egypt, swear an affidavit before a Consul or notary and give his evidence on commission before he could obtain judgment in the English Courts, a very costly proceeding. Much the same principle applies to sending cash in advance: if the dealer is sold out of his offer he may offer substitutes and hold on to the money. The reliable houses are very well known: in all cases of doubt — DON'T. In the case of the Coronation most dealers had to demand cash in advance before they could themselves pay for the stamps. In case of bankruptcy — there was no trust involved — that money would have been attachable by the receiver in favour of all creditors, not only business but private.

No doubt quite a number of small dealers like defaulting book-makers, are amongst the missing, and addresses are sometimes "accommodation" only. It is impossible to be too careful.

### THE 1938 GIBBONS' CATALOGUE Coronation Doubles Stamp Collecting Boom

Over two hundred different new British Empire stamps were issued last May to celebrate the Coronation. When they appeared, stamp collecting was already enjoying the biggest boom it has ever known—a boom which started in 1935, when the Silver Jubilee stamps were issued — but their arrival has added boom to boom, and as there will be an equally keen demand for the numerous forthcoming stamps with portrait of King George VI, the philatelic hobby is obviously in no danger of any early decline in popularity.

The new edition of the Stanley Gibbons Catalogue (sales of which have increased by over 75 per cent. in the last two years) includes all the Coronation stamps, and also some of the earlier issues of King George VI ordinary postage stamps.

As most of them are current, prices for the majority of the Coronation stamps are still low, but as each series becomes obsolete, the tremendous and sustained demand throughout the world will quickly ensure sharp rises in value.

The "stamp famine" mentioned by the publishers in the previous edition is still acute as regards many issues. World prices thus continue to move in an upward direction, and a feature of the new Catalogue is a total of no less than 25,181 price alterations. Some increases in recent years have been very rapid. A 1/- Sierra Leone Wilberforce stamp of 1933 now costs 12. A stamp which, a few months ago, could have been bought at a British P.O. in Morocco for 4d., is listed at 15s., and a recent 1d. one from the same place at 10s. A Liechtenstein 5-franc stamp of modern vintage fetches 16. and many similar instances could be quoted from other countries, for the stamp shortage is world-wide.

In all, 2,019 new stamps have appeared during the past twelve months, and are included in this Catalogue. Aden and Burma (which both have stamps of their own, as a result of the recent Government of India Act), make their first appearance in the volume, as do also the French Indo-Chinese

States of Annam and Cambodia, though there were at one time a few stamps for Annam combined with Tonquin.

Also included for the first time are Italian special issues for use in Abyssinia, with the portrait of the King of Italy, instead of the more romantic likeness of Haile Selassie.

The serious student will be interested in the entirely rewritten list of Austrian issues, in which air stamps and charity stamps are segregated for the first time—a feature which will be gradually extended to the rest of the lists. Ecuador and Liberia have also been rewritten in part.

There are many other improvements, not least the completion of the elimination of indirect references in the headings to many issues. All references are now numerical, and the catalogue is thus now much easier to use. It is still head and shoulders above the best stamp catalogues published in other countries.

#### EGYPTIAN STAMPS IN SCOTT'S CATALOGUE FOR 1938

by Ernest A. Kehr (C.P.E. 398)

Though a few scattered prices were changed in the 1938 edition of Scott's Catalogue, it still does not reflect the true market nor the real interest in Egyptian stamps.

In an effort to bring this section up to date, the writer spent considerable time in untangling most of the mistakes and incorrect listings which prevailed for many years. The majority of corrections, however, were not made and the catalogue continues in its failings.

The Third Issue for instance, is still listed as one set: no distinction being made between the Boulac and Penasson printings. The largest portion of the regular issues remain unaltered in price though four values of the 1879-82 set (10, 20 pa., 1, 2 pi.) were raised 25%. The striking changes in a few of the recent commemoratives comprise appreciations of from 20 to 35%. Among these are the Railway, Aviation, and Postal Union Congress and Graf Zeppelin sets. The 100 m. overprint of 1932 was boosted from \$9 to \$10.

In a few instances minor varieties were added in the Postage Due and Official departments. A pleasing change occurs in the listing of the 2 pi. of 1922. Formerly the

overprint was listed at \$1.25; now the normal stamp is priced at \$3.50 and the inverted is made a minor variety at \$1.25.

The 3m. of 1922 which is a comparatively common stamp in New York, was raised from \$8 to \$10 while some of the other, more elusive items which should have been raised remain unchanged.

#### OUR ADVERTISERS

Mr. Robson Lowe, whose auction sales of stamps, covers and documents of postal and general historical interest have introduced a new and apparently much wanted feature into the commercial life of London is a newcomer to our advertisement pages. «Waghorn» covers crop up quite frequently and fetch double figures of pounds: Dockwra types of Britain are there in plenty and it is remarkable what Mr. Lowe, aided by Mr. Leslie Ray has succeeded in achieving in such a short time. There is no more progressive personality in London philatelic trade circles to-day than Mr. Robson Lowe. His graded scheme of disposing of collections is novel and should prove as popular as the instalment flow which he adopts en-

bling collectors to purchase out of income: this should be popular with the «rentier» class.

The «Raconteur», his organ, has been re-modelled and his catalogue is gaining ground steadily though it is doubtful whether any stamp catalogue will ever be much more than an intelligent conception of limits, within which one can deal. The present slips into the past so rapidly that no one has yet succeeded in arresting the march of time and the views of to-day are not those of to-morrow.

\*\*

As we go to press we are preparing for a rash of Egyptian stamps to the album such as has not been experienced since 1926 and we shall be kept busy chronicling the new issues. Members who desire first-day covers and who do not choose to avail themselves of the facilities we provide have only themselves to blame if they subsequently have to pay more for them.

\*\*

The British packet calls for more contributors from Britain and overseas. There is a constant demand for blocks controls and scarcer varieties.

\*\*

Mr. Thompson wants Sudan «camels» cancelled 1898: he thinks there is something wrong with Gibbons dates: his article will be found in form active as well as inciting to the collector. Sudan is philatelically a country with a good future.

Government, selling it to its people at face value, he will see that such an issue will find its normal place and number in his catalogue.

Every one would like to know the story behind the Souvenir or Miniature Sheets. Why were they issued: Who were the engravers; The origin of the design; How was the sheet set-up; Where was it printed; How many were issued; Was there a special cancellation; and other pertinent data on these souvenir issues.

This is an independent International Association composed of peoples of all the world who are interested in stamp collecting. Special representatives will be selected in the various countries, who in cooperation with their Governments and brother Philatelists, will gather information on all past souvenir issues as well as secure data on issues that are to appear. For the good of both, the collector and dealer members, authentic information will be regularly collected and made available.

The Association will strive to help all collectors, since every collector is a souvenir issue collector, due to the fact that his country or countries has, or will, issue these attractive postal souvenirs.

Our readers are informed that this Association will be pleased to hear from philatelists of all countries who are interested in representing it in their respective countries.

### ENCOURAGING PHILATELY

From an article in « Stamp Collecting », July 24th, 1937:

The Swiss Post Office is extraordinarily encouraging to philatelists. In the handsome postal museum at Berne, the authorities have arranged a very fine international exhibit of stamps, which are shown on sheets of plywood covered with fabric and protected by glass. An ingenious lighting system enables the visitor to distinguish microscopic differences and details when the daylight is not sufficiently powerful.

Three walls of the philatelic exhibit are used to show the newest stamps of every country in the world, and each month these are brought up to date. From time to time the exhibit is changed so that different countries may get the limelight, and complete chronological series shown. Postmarks and seals of early and modern types are shown in cases.

Could we expect to have the same in our postal museum of Cairo?

### BREAK-UP OF A FINE COLLECTION OF EGYPT

Mr. G. Seymour Thompson has decided to dispose of his collection of Egypt.

The collection covers, the pre-stamp period from 1840 right up to the present day with an almost complete range according to Gibbons and many of the Zeheri sub-varieties.
