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SALT STAMPS... A PERMIT REQUIRED TO SELL SALT !

Information concerning the Revenue producing stamps of Egypt has been exceedingly difficult to come by. The author has spent years in research and apart from the Forbin catalog of 1915 and a few articles that have appeared in L'OP and Topics, little is known of their correct usage although many have appeared in the past 80 years or so.

We have known for many years that buyers of salt were required to use a special post office form to which stamps were affixed. Mr. Feltus has now discovered that a permit was also required of vendors, also taxed by the post office department. ed.

Since my article on the Salt Stamps was published three years ago in Egyptian Topics, Vol. 1, No. 1, a new item has come to hand which sheds more light on their usage. It is a Salt Sellers' Permit, or license, dated with an Ayat postmark of January 2nd, 1893. As both sides of the license form bear information of interest, both are illustrated on the following pages, along with an English translation.

The license bears three copies of the 1 pt. blue De La Rue postage stamp, apparently to pay a 3 pt. license fee. This explains the purpose of the 30 m. (3 pt.) "Renewed License" stamps of 1896 and 1897. It now seems reasonable to assume that the 3 pt. license fee was paid with postage stamps until 1896 when the special stamps were introduced.

It is interesting to note that in the instructions to the salt sellers, in both the French and Arabic renditions, it is said that <u>postage</u> stamps will be affixed to the salt requisition forms (see Egyptian Topics No. 19 for an illustration of a typical salt requisition form). Presumably, then, this license form was introduced before it was decided, in 1891, that the Salt Department would have its own stamps. Thus there may exist some pre 1892 salt requisition forms bearing postage stamps to pay for the salt. Such a form would be very interesting, and inasmuch as the highest value postage stamp then in use was the 10 pt., it would probably bear dozens of stamps.

If someone wishes to investigate the matter he might find that a disproportion ately large number of the high value De la Rue postage stamps of that period be ar postmarks with dates in 1891. If you have a large quantity of the 5 pt. or the 10 pt., purple, it would be appreciated if you would check them and report your findings to me or to the editor. Thank you.

To obtain salt from the warehouses, the seller should present himself to the nearest post office and make his request on a printed form prepared for that purpose, and pay the price of the salt which he wants to buy; the postal clerk will receive the money and return the form bearing postage stamps for the amount equal to that paid; the seller posessing the printed form should present himself to the nearest warehouse which will receive the form and will deliver him the requested quantity of salt, plus the commission.

Rules to be observed by salt sellers

1. - To place in front of the store destined to sell salt a plaque which will be furnished gratis by the Administration and on which will be inscribed in Arabic and in French: SALE OF SALT and the number of the permit.

- 2. Not to sell salt except at the Tariff prices and in packages bearing the label of the Administration.
- 3. Not to open and not to be allow the opening of the packages nor to destroy the labels.
- 4. To allow the visits and inspections of Government employees.
- 5. To submit in general to the regulations pertaining to the sale of salt.

WONDERS of the WORLD in

Ancient Egypt

How many remember Breasted's "History of Ancient Civilization"? A half century ago every high school freshman had a considerable familiarity with this book. It was the textbook for a required course in ancient history. Beginning with the pre-Stone Age, it took you through the Stone Age, the discovery of fire and into the Bronze Age (some called it the metal age). We studied the glory of Greece, traced the route of the first marathon race and followed the conquests of the Persians Darius and Cyrus. It was the story of that part of the world that was known as Asia Minor on maps of that day. Today it is more commonly referred to as the Middle East.

Although we studied the wars and conquests, the glory of that area was its art and architecture. To illustrate this phase of ancient history, the student was invited to take a close look at the "Seven Wonders of the World".

Of the seven, two relate to relate to Egypt and are of interest to Egyptian collectors.

The first, on the second

stamp in the series (80 francs) pictures the "Pyramid of Cheops" with the Sphinx in the foreground. It was the largest of the pyramids and was constructed about 2680 B.C. A solid mass, 755 feet on a side and 481 feet high, the structure covers 13 acres. In spite of our modern technology, engineers are still seeking adequate explanation as to how the heavy stone blocks were raised into place. Just recently (1971) an article appeared in a Los Angeles newspaper that advanced the theory (with drawings) that a system of counter-weights was used. Situ ted at Giza, near Cairo, this is the only one of the "Seven Wonders" in existence.

The second "Egyptian Wonder" is the lighthouse on the island of Pharos, near Alexandria, seen on the 130 franc stamp. It did not appear on the list of the "Seven Wonders" until the 6th Century B.C. when it replaced the "Walls of Babylon". Built by Sostratus of Cnidus for Potolomy II about 280 B.C., the tower was built in three stages. The lowest was square, the second octagonal, and the top section was cylin-

drical in shape. A spiral ramp, not seen on the stamp, led to the top of the 440 foot structure where a beacon fire burned at night. It was said these fires were visible for 42 miles at sea. The structure was destroyed by earthquake in the 14th century.

The 80 franc is gray bright blue & brown. The 130 franc is pale

She had many souvenirs of Pourpe; several hundred press cuttings, a copybook in which Pourpe wrote of his trips to Indo-China and Australia, photos, and letters, among them the last he wrote the day before his death.

The withdrawal of British, French and Israeli Forces, during 1956, that had occupied the various parts of Egypt during the dispute over the nationalization of the Suez Canal marked the beginning of the presence of United Nations Forces on Egyptian soil. Originally their presence was to supervise and control the withdrawal. however, troops from many nations; Norway, Sweden, India, Jugoslavia, Canada etc., were to remain in Gaza and various points along the Israel / Egypt frontier for some ten years. In so doing, an interesting sideline for the collectors of Middle Eastern stamps was established.

The United Nations Postal Administration issused, in 1957, a set of two stamps in honor of the United Nations Emergency Forces as the Units in Gaza were known. However, as with other stamps issued by the U.N., these were valid for use only at the post office of the U.N. Headquarters, New York, and not available for the use of various treops comprising the U.N.E.F.

The 1965 overprint UNEF on the 1964 Indian 15 p. Childrens' Day commemorative was the only stamp specifically issued for the use of the Emergency Forces. However, military covers from other nationalities doing a tour of duty with the U.N.E.F. exist, in many cases being readily identifiable by the postmark as with the Swedish cover illustrated on the following page. An excellent work on Swedish military mail cancellations written by TAGE CALLERAS of Sweden, and published by the U.N. Study Unit of the ATA in 1966

The catalog is well illustrated and clutains factual data as to time, town / place, and type of dispatch. Illustrated cancellations are numbered as to type. Also listed is the height and width in millimeters. -ed.

NEED FOR RATE LIST

Our good friend, Mr. K. D. Knight, faithful contributor and now the Honorable Secretary of the Egypt Study Circle in London has written to say that a great need exists for a comprehensive listing of postal rates for the emissions of Egypt and the Sudan.

Mr. Knight cites as an example, the 1937/39 Boy King issue. We agree that there is a need for ALL of the rates from the first issue on, even to date. 1937 is not so long past, and even now we are experiencing difficulty in obtaining this information.

Will anyone among our readers volunteer to do the necessary research ? If not all of the issues, then any particular issue of which they have knowledge. Your editor will be glad to correlate this information and present it in future issues of Topics, as a ready and permanent reference

Those of you who have attempted to obtain this information to annotate pages for your albums, for special study, or for exhibition know of the challenge it presents.

BRITISH CAMPAIGNS !

Mr. John Firebrace of London and the Egypt Study Circle is making a comprehensive study of the following British Military Campaigns and he requests information:

- The French British Campaign in Egypt circa 1798 - 1802
- 2. The British Campaign of 1807
- The British Campaign / Occupation of Egypt and the Sudan - 1882 - 1886.

While we will cover as much of the material available in our regular bibliography, unfortunately we have not been able to do this in advance. Each section of the bibliography is made up as we go along.

Peter Smith has provided us with a considerable amount of information on the Napoleonic Campaign and on the Sudan Conquests, however, much remains to be done, particularly the Campaign of 1807 where very little has been published to date. If you can help with any one of these campaigns, even tho fragmentary, please forward it to the editor. We would like to present it in Topics and we will forward copies to Mr. Firebrace.

A RARE LEITER FROM EGYPT

In Topics, Vol. 2, No. 3 Mr. Jean Boulad d'Humieres wrote about two very unusual markings relating to the Napoleonic Campaign in Egypt. He illustrated the handstamp V. D.M.P. TOULON on a cover fron Egypt to France and stated it was exceedingly rare, only one cover being known till now. At present, there must at least two of them as another fine example was sold in a Parisian auction in December, 1971 for \$125.00.

Let us first examine the outside of the letter. It is of a rather small size, measuring 95 x 70 mm. when folded and 310 x 215 mm. unfolded. Disinfection by vinegar has left heavy stains, mainly on the front and on the first page. The paper of the letter is watermarked. The large ($12 \times 5 \text{ cm.}$) and elegant drawing is made of curved lines and other ornaments topped by the initials E. B.

The hand written address reads:

A Le Citoyenne Duhamel Maison de la C^{ne} V Le Moussu A Bayeux Department du Calados

Cne stands for Citoyenne, V for "Veuve", i. e. (widow). It bears a good legible strike V.D.M.P. TOULCN (for VOYE DE MER PAR TOULON, i.e. by sea to Toulon). It also carries a tax marking: 10 (decimes). It appears that this military mail was carried free to Toulon only, and that tax had to be paid for carrying it between Toulon and its final destination (Bayeaux).

> The V.D.M.P. TOULON marking is by no means rare in itself and is found on many old letters. It is described by Salles, as quoted by Mr. Boulad and by Mr. Lenain too, under No. 18 in his fundamental catalogue of ancient French Army markings.

What makes this letter so interesting is that it was written in Cairo, as we learn on inspection of the inside. It is dated "Au Grand Caire, 19 Vandemiaire An IX (is <u>September</u>, 1800) and is a soldier's 14.10 letter to his mother.

The text is too long to be reproduced here, but one interesting paragraph deserves to be quoted. After several complaints about the lack of news from his family, he writes:

A RARE SOLDIER'S LETTER TO HIS MOTHER FROM EGYPT IN 1800



"For two and a half years we have been in this country. Seven or eight ships have arrived from France carrying letters for the army but none of those I should have received have reached me. In my last letter transmitted to you by a young man from Bayeaux, going back to France with General Davout. I expressed the hope I had to be back in Toulon for last Floreal, but unfortunately we are kept here and I don't know when the happy day will come which will see us leaving this country."

When the letter was written Napoleon had left Egypt nearly one year previous (24 Vandemisire An VIII), and the French army was commanded by General Menou, after Kleber's murder. Since the destruction of the French fleet in Aboukir (16 Thermidor An VIII, 3 Aout, 1798) and the blockade made by the English, the relations between the army and France had become very difficult. That is why it seems surprising to read that there had been seven or eight ships that could reach Egypt with letters for the army. The The writer says he transmitted his last letter to his mother by a young man going back to France with Gen. Davout. He would not have been surprised to hear his letter never reached Bayeaux, had he known that the ship carrying the General and his lettor was hailed on the high seas by

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the English Navy.

General Davout was later released but no doubt the mail was kept and keenly studied by the English. He had a better chance next time and this letter did go through !

The "happy day" the soldier is hoping for happened exactly one year later. The French army left Egypt in Vendemiaire AN X - September, 1 01.

POSTAL UNION OF AFRICA - EXECUTIVE MEET-

ING HELD IN CAIRO.

On our recent trip we flew from Rome to Cairo, having been invited to attend the Executive Council meeting of the Postal Union of Africa. The ten day Congress was largely devoted to the discussion of the many technical aspects of the Postal services and the difficulties which continue to plague most of the nations which emerged from former colonial positions in 1957. From the discussions which were simultaneously translated from or into French, English and Arabic) it became clear that there is yet much to be done if post al services in Africa are to meet even the lowest standards of more developed lands. There was general agreement that improvement is imperative but that the finances necessary to introduce them are just not available. The U.P.U., of which all are already members, is offering a variety of technical assistance programs, but as was indicated, "the seminars conducted by experts of the Western World do not touch the problems African Countries face . . . it is necessary to plan training programs that relate to specific needs". There is a further problem; some African nations also are members of the Postal Union of Africa and Malagache and/or the Arab Postal Union, so actually they could avail themselves of seminars conducted by four organizations, but simply don't have the funds to do so. In an effort to raise funds, some countries have turned to a variety of meth-

ods to get additional cash. This, some of the delegates were frank to admit, had led them to enter into contracts with pro ional "philatelic agencies" which 1 ised them pie-in-the-sky profits. ministration has steadfastly refrained from making any deals (largely because Cairo officials, which closely cooperate with with Khartoum, advised against this), but sought other ways that might seem a bit strange. Sudanese post offices. for example act as agents for entertainment and gambling facilities. One can walk into a post office and order tickets for sports, music or motion picture events to be held in the same or a different city; he can also buy pool tickets involving sports tickets . There is no service charge to the client, but a commission of between four and seven per centum is paid by the organization.

VISIT TO THE MONUMENTS OF NUBIA

Following the congress, we returned to Upper Egypt and Nubia to again visit the profusion of monuments in that area, especially to see the effects of the High Damat Aswan.

The High Dam is practically completed and certainly stands as nothing short of an engineering miracle. Its immense granite, concrete and steel barriers holding back the Nile's waters to form the world's largest artificial lake that stretches many miles deep into the Sudan. To serve the postal needs of the thousands of Russians and native workmen and their families housed in huge colonies, the Egyptian Postal Organization has opened and is operating post offices on the east and west sides of the Dam, each with its own "High Dam" postmarks.

mark on the Nile's map, with tourists coming by river boat from Khartoum or Aswan, stopping for a few hours to allow passengers to visit the immense temples carved right into the bowels of the sandstone mountains.

The cutting of these temples out of their original location (stone by stone) to the top of the mountains by UNESCO funded programs, required thousands of engineers and laborers. To accomodate them, a community was erected to house them all; a mosque; airstrip, shopping center and post office were all included to make Abu Simbela real city.

Until we visited it, we had read no reports of this post office already in operation 5 years, whose handstamp marking is actually in error. The Arabic inscription is correctly spelled "ABU SYMBEL", but the English is mistakenly spelled "ABU SENBEL". The Arabic "mim" or "M" having been transliterated as as "nun" or "N".

Eds. note: An excellent article appeared in the NATIONAL STAMP NEWS of February 29th 1972, written in the unmistakable style of Ernie Kehr. It erroneously carried the byline of Don Shannon. We quickly wrote Ernie who clarified the matter. We recommend this article if you are interested in the unusual in Egyptian postmarks, and in the monuments of Nubia.
