40. Sarras. This will be dry & uninteresting. Shall be here for at least 8 Days as Hunter will not be back till then. I have a comfortable tent here. On the march we sleep out, not much hardship in this climate, but one wants shade in the daytime. The Tennants might like to see my diary when it becomes more interesting. Have written to Beatrice, wish I could be at the Wedding. (Not included with cover).

41. Halfa. (On official H.Q., Dongola Expeditionary Force paper.) I was sent up here from Sarras & came in here yesterday. I found there was so much to do that I could not get away by the morning train so shall remain till tomorrow. 69 young horses have just arrived here for me. They are a nice lot on the whole, much better than I ever expected to get. Benson has turned up here, to be attached to the Intelligence Dept, & be finally with the gun-boats being built- I hear the reporters who are kept here & not allowed to go up to the front have sent home some wonderful pictures & accounts of my fight the other day. You may put them down as all lies. None of them were there & we were a little too busy to make pictures. Young Fincastle, my galloper, is the Son of Ld. Dunmore. Nice young fellow & did most excellently the other day. The post boat has just arrived. I shall get my letters early tomorrow morning when I get back to Sarras. None of my diary of course must be published in any paper, but I do not mind friends seeing it. (Not included with cover).

45. Hammada's House, Suada. (On a Webster's Express Tablet.) My dear Papa, I sent off my diary yesterday. I do not know what view may be taken of our work here at home. They made me a Miralai on the Field but that does me no good though it was a great compliment & kind of the Sirdar. Could you see Sir Evelyn Wood privately. A Brevet now would help me a lot in view of further operations. My men did splendidly and I have the greatest confidence in them. They will charge home and are only too keen to go. I have written today to Charlie Tennant to ask him to interest Sir W. Marriott in my favour, his Father in Law's interest with Lord Huntingdon would help, I am sure and I know Lord Wolseley & Sir Redvers Butler would help me if they could. This is the best place I have been in for some time. I have now made it safe and I am most comfortable. I am at present in command of 2 Squadrons, 2 Batteries 2 Battalions and only wish they would come on to attack me but I fear the nearest sound Dervish is 40 miles off.

47. Suada 14.6.96 My dear Papa Just a line to say the [that] Mr. Gwynne, Reuters Agent, has been good enough to say that he will arrange to have all the Reuters telegrams sent to you free. All well here. Am very fit. Yr. Affec. Son, Frank

48. Suada. (Army form C398). Just a line to tell you that all goes well here. It is now somewhat dull. We are bound to wait now till the Nile rises and very slowly it seems to be coming up. I got your letter yesterday, written in London after you had seen the Times of Tuesday the 9th. I should like my allowance put into the Bank of Scotland. There is some money which must be paid to the Humber Cycle Company before the 1st of October to make up some allotment when the shares were redistributed. Would you pay this for me? I think you had the

papers about it, at any rate I have nothing here. Thanks for taking up for me the share in the Orient Co. I received 6 numbers of Pearsons Magazine full of teaching. Thanks, I want books badly. I have never yet heard if Bourne has got a foal or not. I fear now it cannot be the case. No news here of an autumn British Campaign. I got the Globe you sent. It is probable that Greatrex has been sent back but not as 2nd in Command.

49. Suarda. Just a line to catch the Mail to tell you that I am all right & fit & well. I leave this early tomorrow morning. Benson is better but not yet fit enough to move. It is only a simple go of fever. I shall go through to Kosheh where the Hd. Quarters are in one day and next day probably on to Okhmeh. I enclose ten pages diary.

50. Ambigol. Just a line to say that I arrived here all right yesterday after a very nice journey though it was a little lonely. I had a nice quiet day at the Hd. Quarter Camp on the way.

I found 5 squadrons here all well also Horse Artillery & Camel Corps. They however are not staying here but are going on to Sarras. I have had more of this place than any other. The things you sent by McMahon arrived all right. The cake from Buzzards has not yet come. Post is the only way to send things.

51. Copy letter to his Mother. Ambigol. I hope the above diary will reach you all right. I am very fit and well as are all the British Officers here. I had a letter from Beatrice yesterday, also one from Maggie Parker asking me to be Godfather to her boy which of course I shall be glad to do. Would you ask the Governor to put £10 of my money in the Post Office Savings Bank in his name, which will accumulate for him. I have just written to Minnie to wish her many happy returns of the day. It ought to arrive on or about her birthday. I remain, Yr. Affec. Son, Frank

52. Sarras. Here I am still at Sarras and very much tired of it but fit & well. I sha'nt send you the diary this week as there is absolutely nothing in it. Each day is the same as the last and no chance of a move. For some weeks none of the Steamers have passed this. Yet for some time we must sit still. I have a good double fly tent in a nice airy position as they go in this country. The thermometer rarely goes up in it above 110° which is less than we had in May. McMahon is with me all well as are also Broadwood, Legge Peyton, Persse & a Vety. Surgeon named Smith.

We have lost some men by Cholera but I hope have got to the end of it now. We have several cases recovering and the last cases have been light, which is a very good sign. As the Nile rises we hope that it will disappear.

Please tell the Governor that I think that there is nothing to be done re promotion; unless recommended from here nothing can be done - and I fancy no despatch has as yet been sent in by the Sirdar. All will come right in the end. The filly should be called 'Baggarieh'' which is the feminine of Baggara. I hope that she is growing and that she has plenty of bone, which means that I hope that her legs are not too pretty & thin.

I am so glad to hear that Uncle Archie is to go to Browsholme for the 12th. I do hope that they will have good sport-

53. Sarras. The writing paper has arrived just when wanted. Please send me six 6 thin under vests not more. They only block up my kit and I can't carry them and indeed shall have to send a lot of things to Halfa when we move. The weather is a bit cooler again now but not quite what one would select. I am however perfectly well as we all are now.

The 3rd cake arrived all right. I REMAIN, Yr affec. Son, Frank

54. Sarras. I am particularly glad that you did not write to the "Times". Nothing is further from my views. They probably have my official report at the W. Office. There is no use mincing matters. One squadron did not behave as it should have done but the situation was saved by the other two.

The military rank of "MiraIai" does not carry with it the civilian title of Pasha. What difference it makes either way I do not see. The weather is still nasty here but we have had no more cholera.

We have never had a fight with the Dervishesyet which has not been reported to the Khalifa as a victory for them. Wingate's history of the Squadron shows this very dearly. For this reason the Khalifa always employs his own postmen who give him the true news whatever the letters he carries may say. I don't expect to move on for some little time yet. We are all very well here.

55. Sarras. 13.8.96 Though you will probably be in Scotland when this letter arrives yet I think I had better write to Riverhead as it is safer. We have had no cholera now for nearly two weeks so may be said to be clear of it. On the whole we have got through it very well. Beatrice's photograph arrived yesterday. It is very good. On looking at it I find I must cut off the cardboard edges as I have only two camels to carry my kit-I am sending you two very dull sheets of diary. With much love, yr. sffec. son, Frank

56. Sakamatto. 26.8.96 Here we are blocked again because they can't get forage up. But this time it is more trying because other troops have gone on. I do hope we shall get a chance. Last night we had a desperate gale which made us most uncomfortable for the time but did no real harm.

My servants did excellently well & none of the horses broke away, but everything is damp & horrid today. We are all of us very fit and well in spite of it all.

Would you ask the Governor to pay Gasking's bill which has blown away in the gale & also an allotment due to Humber Co. before October. I enclose some diary. With much love, I remain, yr. sffec. son, Frank

57. Okhmeh. After many troubles & much delay things look a little better. The weather has improved and the wind is in the right direction. Our spirits are up accordingly. I enclose some more very dull diary. I hope that you are all having a good time at Inverbraan. With much love, Yr affec son, FRANK Okhmeh 3/9/96

58. Kosheh. I am off tomorrow for the South, so I am sending you what there is of the diary before I start.

The Railway is now working all right again and there is no reason why the general advance should not begin in a day or two. The new steamer is nearly finished. A couple or three days ought to put it to rights.

The weather now for the last four days has been perfect with nice cool nights, so we have been able to do better in the sleeping way and in consequence we are all very well. I fear that I shall miss the next mail.

59. Fereig. (Written on back of Telegraph Form.) Just a line to keep you going as I may not be able to write for some time. We have an enormous army here and more in a few days. I yesterday did a long patrol across the bend of the River to a place called Shetab-el-Meyer, South of Sadek. I met a few Dervishes. One of my patrols met nine & accounted for six. I was never better in my life.

Your letter of 27th Augt. received.

60. Dongola. I am sending you my diary which contains a very hurried and inadequate account of the last few days. They have been full of incidents and most interesting.

We are now in a nice camp & my tent has just arrived so we are all right. I suppose that before very long I shall be on my way home, but I have much to do & to arrange before I can get away. I am very fit and well.

61. Dongola. I fear that my account of the latter part of the Campaign has been very vague indeed, but I can't help it. We have had a desperately dull time in the last week. I hope that things will be arranged before long and that I shall be able to start for Cairo. Am very well. Please send the cheque to Cox.

62. Cairo. As you will have heard from the wire which I sent yesterday I arrived here very fit and well yesterday morning.

It seems now that I am back in my home here as if I have only been away a week. Martin has looked after everything in a most excellent manner. I am going down to the War Office this morning to find out what my orders are. I expect to have to go home soon but I do not want to start for some little time. There is much to be done and arranged here and I do not wish to leave things in anything but good working order. I have also to sell my household goods and my horses which have not as yet arrived from Dongola. In ope they will be in tomorrow or the next day at the latest.

I fear that I have missed many letters as they have been sent up to Dongo1a and missed me on the way. With very much love I remain your affec- Son,
