REPORT of MEETINGS of EGYPT STUDY CIRCLE, "The Peacock", Maiden Lane, London W.C.2

184th Meeting held on 13th October 1979

Attending were the Chairman, Mr J. Sears, and Messrs M. Abou-Alam, P. Andrews, F.W.Benians, D.H.Clarke, C.E.H.Defriez, G.P.Green, J.A.Grimmer, E.Hall, Major E.L.G. MacArthur and P.E.Whetter.

The Chairman regretted that, because of the small number of members, other than those who normally attended London meetings, who had intended to attend at Leeds, he had written to all members living locally to Leeds, but only one further member had replied. In consultation with Mr K. Pogson, who was organising the Leeds Provincial Meeting, the Chairman had then abandoned that meeting. Regret was expressed but it was decided to try again in 1980 to hold a Provincial Meeting and Mr Peter Andrews offered to organise it in Birmingham. It was decided that this would be held on Saturday 14th June 1980. There would be no set subject and all members would be asked to bring 20 sheets.

May 1980 Exhibition. The use of a meetings room at the Exhibition had been booked for Wednesday 7th May, 2.30 pm to 4.30 pm. For a social evening, a room had been booked at the Tournament Hotel, Kensington on Saturday 10th May from 4pm to 8 pm. Members and their ladies would be welcomed and members were asked to let the Chairman know how many would attend. Further details of these would be made known later.

Back Numbers of the Q.C. It was reported that the stock had now been collected from the former editor and was in the care of the Librarian, Mr Jim Benians. These were available for sale to members, price 60p each, plus postage.

Maj. MacArthur offered to have bound two sets of the Q.C., from the latest date previously bound.

Library: Mr Benians would operate this and would produce a Library List for publication in the Q.C. It was regretted that postal borrowing would not be possible, but members would need to collect and return to the ESC meetings.

The Philatelic Record. It was noted that several of the sections of the Record were in the hands of various Study Leaders. Mr D.H.Clarke had custody of the remaining sections and agreed to be Keeper of the Record. He needed co-operation from Members as to entries to be recorded.

Index. Mr E. Hall agreed to compile an Index to L.O.P. and the Q.C.

Maj. MacArthur reported the death of Mrs Jean Potter, wife of the former editor, a few days earlier. Condolences were expressed to Mr Ron Potter on his sad loss.

Secretary/Treasurer. It was reported that Mr K. Davis had offered to do the work of Treasurer. Appointments of Officers would be dealt with at the December meeting.

Mr Clarke reported two new Members: Mr Maurice V. Taylor and Mr Kenneth M. H. Coleman.

Displays were then given, including New Zealand Forces in World War II, Modern Varieties and stamp booklets, by Mr F.W.Benians, Mr C.E.H.Defriez, Maj. E.L.G. MacArthur, Mr P.E.Whetter and Mr P. Andrews.

I have five covers showing the Egyptian version of this marking, and can find no reference to its use in Egypt other than in "L'Orient Philatelique" No. 78, page 347 (Gabriel Boulad ESC 66), No. 83 page 178 (Gabriel Boulad and presumably referring to the same cover), and No. 80 page 506 (Danson ESC 32).

Charles Minett (77) had made some sparse notes which included incomplete details of a further cover in Eric Haffeles' (116) collection.

The normal use of this marking is defined in the Universal Postal Union Regulations of 1875 :-

"REGULATION V Section 2. In case postage stamps may be used which are not of any value in the country of origin, no account shall be taken of them. This fact shall be indicated by the figure 'O' placed by the side of the postage stamps."

and would appear in conjunction with the 'T' marking indicating that postage due (Taxe) should be charged. This is illustrated by covers which I have (numbered 2, 3, 7, 8, 9 and 10) and on which the postage due charges have been, or should have been, collected from the addressee. Similarly marked are covers Nos. 1, 5 and 6 but in these cases the 'T' and the framed 'O' have been subsequently cancelled because for one reason or another the Postal Authorities have decided that the stamps should after all be allowed to pay the postage and have, therefore, let the covers through untaxed.

Exceptions to this 'normal use' appear on the covers described by Gabriel Boulad in "L'Orient Philatelique", and the oval has been applied (doubtless in Egypt) as a dumb cancellation on otherwise uncancelled Egyptian stamps on incoming mail presumably to prevent their re-use in Egypt ! (Cover No. 11). Although the 'O' does not appear on the cover (No. 12) addressed to Ramleh-Ibrahimich this cover is relevant to these notes in that it is similar to No. 11, but a retta cancellation has been applied to the previously uncancelled Egyptian stamps on the incoming mail, and this would presumably be the dumb cancellor available at that location (or possibly en route to it ?). Indeed the retta may have been the normal cancellation for <u>out</u>-going mail from this location - has anyone a cover from Ramleh-Ibrahimich, or ever seen a circular date stamp or other (rural ?) cancellation from there ?

Cover No. 4 is extraordinary in that the mark has been used apparently to denote that the French Office (Alexandrie) stamps which had paid the postage to Trieste were unacceptable on the forwarded incoming mail.

Covers 13 and 14 are relevant to this study because the framed 'T' has been used, instead of the 'O' as with the other covers of the same period, to denote that stamps were not valid for postage.

Gabriel Boulad mentions in his article that the use of the framed oval is rare, but I am uncertain as to whether he is referring specifically to its undoubted very rare use to cancel Egyptian stamps on incoming mail. There must be few instances indeed where an attempt has been made to use Egyptian stamps to pay postage from an outside country; with the obvious exception of mail posted through Egyptian Consular Offices abroad, or mail posted on board ships.

It seems to me extraordinary that these framed oval markings should be so scarce in view of their use from at least as early as 1893 (cover No. 1) to as late as 1953; notwithstanding the relative scarcity of Postage Due mail anyway, and the evidence we have that the oval was not always used when it could (or indeed should) have been !

I am anxious to obtain, or at least to receive details of, any other covers showing this 'O' marking - from any countries of the World. I have seen or heard of it from various locations - but in manuscript - and I am left wondering at the moment as to whether Egypt was the only country to use a hand-struck stamps for the device.

In conclusion I would like to thank those who have assisted me in putting these notes together, and especially Peter Smith (74) and Martin Lynes (210).

An article "International Postage Due and the U.P.U." by E. Keith Parker was published in Stamp Collecting on 29th December 1977, and quotes relevant sections of the Berne Treaty (U.P.U.) effective from 1st July 1875 - viz Article III, Article VI and detailed Regulations III, V and VII.

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There follow descriptions of covers in chronological order, a table and illustrations.

1) Envelope franked with GB 2¹/₂d Queen Victoria stamp: addressed to FRANCE, no details of arrival marks if any. Two framed ovals (Minett states 10.25 mms) round stamp, cds SUEZ / 15.XII.93 TI. The two framed ovals have been struck out in blue pencil, and the 'Pleine Mer' marking applied to the stamp. (Early days for 'Pleine Mer' but that is another story !).

It would appear (from Danson's notes) that the framed ovals were applied to indicate improper use of an English stamp in the Egyptian Postal Service, but then the Authorities cancelled the stamp (correct rate to France) with the 'Pleine Mer' mark to show it was a Sea Letter, and then struck out the ovals.

No postage due charged. (LOP 80, page 506, Danson).

2) Postal Stationery post-card of Austrian Levant 20 paras / 5 Kr. Framed Oval(s?), boxed 'T', cds SUEZ / 22.1.97 T2, also cds Alex / A 23. 1. 97 TI

Arrival LONDON JA 28 / 97 Postage Due mark (London) F.B/C 5d

with Aust. Lloyd XLVI in blue M/script: from S.S. 'GISELA' (Minett note, Eric Haffele collection).

3) Postal Stationery card - France 10 centimes overprinted 'Alexandrie' Stamp uncancelled.

- a) Two framed ovals (10,5 x 10 mms) struck in black, one to the left, the other below, the stamp.
- b) Pencilled initials to the left of the stamp (presumably those of the postal clerk who applied the ovals and the following mark (c).
- c) Boxed 'T' towards left side of post-card, struck in black.

d) cds ALEXANDRIE / D / 13 I O1 / Arabic, struck in black.

Note: a), b), c) and d) all presumably applied in Alexandria.

- e) N.P.B. / 2d struck in black (London).
- f) cds EASTBOURNE / 12AM / JA 20 / 01

The charge of 2d represents twice the post-card rate (i.e. 4 milliemes = 1d).

The card was written on the 12th January 1901 from the Hotel Continental Alexandria - the writer had apparently been delayed due to illness of passengers on board ship. He was boarding a steamer on that day bound for Trieste.

This card was presumably posted in an Egyptian Post Box, and not in the French Consular Office, hence the stamp was not acceptable to the Egyptian Postal Authorities and the 'Taxe' markings were applied.

(Potter collection).

- 4) Envelope franked with Alexandrie 2 and 5 centimes stamps cancelled ALEXANDRIE / 7 / MARS / 12 / EGYPTE.
 - a) framed oval of Cairo
 - b) pencilled 'T'

4 c) cds CAIRO / 8-III.12 4-P.M. cancelling one piastre Postage Due stamp of Egypt.

Addressed to Trieste, but re-directed to Poste Restante, Caire, Egypte. It would appear that the French Post Office Alexandrie stamps were not acceptable to the Egyptian Postal Authorities on the <u>INCOMING MAIL</u>.

- 5) Envelope franked with 2 x GB 1d. KGV stamps, cancelled with a cork cancellation struck in black, one on each stamp.
 - a) Three framed ovals (13.5 x 13.5 mms) struck in black. (These ovals are distinctive not only for their larger size but there is a projection at the left of them giving the appearance of a reversed 'Q' this may be due only to smudging or perhaps damage to the handstamp). One oval is to the left, and one below, each of the adhesives.
 - b) Framed 'T' upper centre of envelope, struck in black.

c) cds CAIRO / M 26.IX.14 11.30 A.M. / Arabic; struck in black.

Note: a), b) and c) all presumably struck in Cairo.

d) The framed 'T' and the two stamps have been cancelled with what appears to be a cork cancellation struck in black.

(Where was this applied ? London ? - to prevent re-use ?).

e) cds LONDON / 3.30 PM / 16 OC / 14 / F.S.15 ~ backstamp.

This was war-time and presumably the letter was allowed to go through untaxed, although franked with stamps unacceptable to the Egyptian Postal Authorities. (Potter collection).

6) Envelope printed 'from Cox's Shipping Agency Port Said', franked with Indian stamps overprinted 'I.E.F. ' - 4 x 3 pies, 2 x $\frac{1}{2}$ anna, and 3 x 1 anna.

The stamps are uncancelled.

- a) Four framed ovals $(9.5 \times 9 \text{ mms})$ struck in black, two above and two below the stamps.
- b) Boxed 'T' at left of the stamps, struck in black.
- c) cds PORT SAID / B / 8-IV.15. 10.-AM / Arabic; struck in black.

Note: a), b) and c) all presumably applied in Port Said.

d) No arrival, or other, markings.

Addressed to Cheshire, England.

This was also war-time and similarly to 5) above the letter was allowed to go through untaxed, although franked with unacceptable stamps.

Indian 1 rupee in 1915 was equivalent to 1s. 4d. so that the 5 annas in stamps = 5d. which would appear to be double the rate required (i.e. 10 milliemes = $2\frac{1}{2}d$.) (Potter collection).

7) Envelope franked with 10 milliemes 1931 Agriculture and Industrial Exhibition stamp.

Stamp uncancelled.

- a) Two framed ovals (9.5 x 9 mms) struck in black, one to the left and one below the stamp.
- b) Boxed 'T' left and below the stamp, struck in black.
- c) cds Arabic / 17 MA 31. 10-- / PORT-SAID / F struck in black.
- Note: a), b) and c) all presumably applied at Port Said.

d) 3d. / I.S. / R. struck in black (London).



1914: Gt Britain stamps not accepted as valid.

7 e) cds READING / 25 MY / 31 / 6 cancelling 3d. postage due stamp.

The charge collected (3d.) represents normal rate (10 milliemes = $2\frac{1}{2}d$.) to nearest penny above.

The two ovals are joined by a curved pencil line 'ringing' the stamp.

This letter dated 17 May was posted two days after this commemorative stamp was invalidated, hence the stamp unacceptable to the vigilant Egyptian Postal clerk. (Potter collection).

- 8) Envelope franked with 10 milliemes Fuad 1927 issue, and a bisected 10 milliemes of the same issue.
 - a) Framed '0' beside the bisected stamp.
 - b) Framed 'T' struck below stamp.
 - c) 2 x 40 centesimi Italian Postage Due stamps cancelled with Italian cds 28 VIII 31.

Addressed to Trieste, Italia.

(Peter Smith collection).

9) Envelope with AIR MAIL label and franked with 1 x 5 milliemes Fuad 1927 issue, 1 x 15 milliemes 1936 Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition, and 1 x 1933 8 milliemes Air-Mail stamp.

The 5 and 8 milliemes stamps cancelled with cds, but the 15 milliemes commemorative stamp is uncancelled.

- a) Three <u>pencilled</u> rings below stamp, one framed oval below and to right of stamp struck in black clear of cds below stamp.
- b) Boxed 'T' below stamp, to left of, and also clear of the same cds.
- c) cds Arabic / 15 MA.36. 7.-p. / ALEXANDRIA / DEPART struck in black one cancelling each of the two stamps, and a third (referred to above) below the commemorative stamp.
- d) 1/40 in the same indelible pencil used for the 'rings' as a) above.

Note: a), b), c) and d) all presumably applied at Alexandria.

- e) 4d. / I.S. / C. struck in black (London).
- f) cds SALTASH / 15 AM / 20.5.36 / CORNWALL cancelling pair of 2d. GB Postage Due stamps.

The charge 4d. represents only the insufficient postage (the unacceptable 15 milliemes stamp = $3\frac{3}{4}d$. - to the nearest 1d. above).

1/40 Gold Franc = 10d. 40c = 4d.

This letter postmarked 15 May 1936 was posted <u>one day</u> after the commemorative stamp had been invalidated.

(Note: Zeheri catalogue is incorrect, see LOP 28/5/36, page 44).

- 10) Envelope franked with GB $3 \times \frac{1}{2}d$. KGVI stamps.
 - a) 6 x <u>manuscript</u> 'O's round the pair, and 4 x manuscript 'O's round the single stamp below.
 - b) Framed 'T' struck as usual away from the stamps.
 - c) cds 10.0C.53 5.30-- / PORT SAID / T
 - d) 1¹/₂d. / I.S. / K. handstruck (London).
 - e) cds MANCHESTER / 24 OC / 53 / P.B. cancelling 1¹/₂d. GB postage due stamp.

Stamps not acceptable to the Egyptian Postal Authorities and postage due duly charged, and collected from the addressee.

11) Envelope addressed to Alexandria from Beyrouth franked with :-

Lebanon 2 x 3 PT. France 3 x 25c. Egypt 1 and 3 milliemes 1927 issue, and 4 milliemes 1923 issue

- a) The Lebanese and French stamps have been cancelled with cds BIR.AMB / MARITIN / 26 APR 39 / CONSTANTA / ALEXANDRIA (i.e Rumanian Maritime Cancel).
- b) The Egyptian stamps (left uncancelled) have had a framed oval struck <u>ON</u> each of them.

Gabriel Boulad in his notes states that he does not understand why the French stamps have been accepted and not the Egyptian - but I would point out that no postage due has been charged , which seems to lend weight to my suggestions in the text.

12) Envelope addressed to Ramleh-Ibrahimich franked with :-

Lebanon 5 PT. France 4 x 25c. Egypt pair of 2 milliemes, and a 4 milliemes, 1937 issue.

- a) The Lebanese and French stamps have been cancelled similarly to 11) above.
- b) The Egyptian stamps have had a retta struck ON them.

13) Envelope franked with 5 milliemes 1931 Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition stamp.

No framed 'O' used BUT stamp uncancelled and :-

The Egyptian Post Office at Galipoli

The May 31st 1979 sale of Stanley Gibbons Auctions Ltd contained a marvelous array of rare Egypt. The quality was high with respect to both intrinsic interest and authenticity, and the fact that I pick out one small item from it as a forgery should not be taken as significant criticism. In fact, as the buyer of the lot in question, I judged the value of the other, genuine, items in it to be well worth the sale price, and I had no wish to return it !

There were three lots containing stamps cancelled at the Galipoli office. Lot number 381 was a 2 PT stamp of 1867 cancelled with a genuine strike of the exceedingly rare intaglio seal of this office, and one of only five examples I kmow of. Lot number 382 was also genuine - a very nice example of the 2 PT of 1872 bisected to make the 1 PT rate, and cancelled 4 APR 1873 *. This example is on a neat, rectangular piece, tied over the diagonal cut, and signed by A. Diena. The latter fact, however, should not be taken as reliable evidence of genuineness, for signatures of experts are themselves easily forged, and Mr Diena has been known to err more than once with respect to Egyptian items. I further examined this item with the Comparatec "optical blink" comparing device, and found that it matches precisely with cancellations on whole stamps. (I have never heard of any cover bearing the Galipoli bisect).

The real subject of this note is lot number 383, which contained four loose singles with strikes of the Galipoli office: 1872 1 PT; 1875 20 para and 1 PT; and 1879 5 para De La Rue. Three were genuine, but the 1875 1 PT was not. It bore the forgery well known to specialists by a small "o" in GALIPoLI, and can be recognised at a glance. The cancellation of the Tripoli office has also been forged by the same forger, incidentally, and his product reads TRIPoLI ! Beware !

* NOTE: at an uncertain date in 1873-4, the Galipoli datestamp changed from four digits to two in the year date.

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Peter Smith's recent valuable articles on forged 'Used Abroads' prompts me to draw attention to Lot 331 in Stanley Gibbons' All World Sale on 4th October 1979. The stamp was illustrated, but in case this does not reproduce well, I should mention that the portion of the postmark - on a 5-para of the 1872 issue - reads " V.R. POS . . SALONIC . . " with a clear date " 20 NOV 72 ". The reverse bears a Bolaffi guarantee mark in red.

The postmark is certainly not Type 111-1.5n, which so far as I know is the only type recorded as having been used at this office, and is not unlike 111-1n although the diameter of the outer circle is 25mm. Moreover the date is rater late for an office which is supposed to have closed on 15th February 1872 (the Data Sheets show use up to 5th May 1872). There are I know forgeries with the spelling "SALONICCA " and with the correct spelling but as I do not possess examples of either I cannot make useful comparisons.

Apparently the buyer did not share my misgivings, as the stamp, badly thinned, fetched £ 62, plus 10% premium. I would welcome comments.

Incidentally in the same sale an 1872 1-piastre used in Metelino on 25th December 1873 fetched £ 52 plus 10%. This is the same date as recorded in the Data Sheets for the latest use of the Type 111-1.5n datestamp at this office.

Partly due to her ancient past and strategic importance Egypt has always attracted the attention of both her neighbours and many of the great European Powers. With the spread of rail networks all over Europe and, latterly, the completion of the Suez Canal an increasing number of visitors came to her shores.

The main European ports of embarkation were Marseilles, Naples, Brindisi, Genoa, Venice and Trieste and, as will be seen from the chart, there were a variety of shipping lines providing regular passenger/mail services from one or other of these ports. In addition there were many cargo/passenger and cargo shipping companies whose ships made regular calls at Egyptian ports. It is very doubtful whether these ships carried mails but their passengers and crew used the ship/shore postal facilities, thus helping to give a better picture of the volume and variety of sea traffic to and from Egypt.

There was in addition the considerable Black Sea/Constantinople/Asia Minor ports traffic to Egypt. There is no doubt it existed but examples of mail carried are difficult to find.

Furthermore there are the Egyptian Railway cancellations to consider. They seem to have been applied at the port of entry of the mail, e.g. Alexandria. It is felt that this is part of the whole picture.

Paquebot, Pleine Mer ship cancellations are to be found on many countries' stamps and cards as also are "port of arrival" cancellations, notably Great Britain and also M.B. (Mobile Box or Boite Mobile). Such form a study in themselves and it is hoped that some day this aspect will be examined as it is all part of Egyptian Maritime Postal History.

Mention should also be made of the French, British and Austrian Post Offices at Alexandria, Port Said and Suez; and notleast Lt. Waghorn for his "overland service of goods and mail" to Suez, the forerunner of the Suez Canal.

The Boxer Rebellion in China, and the expansion of European interests in the Far East, saw a considerable increase in traffic through the Suez Canal with a resultant demand for postal services. The German Navy used a "Marine Schiffspost" numbering system and it is therefore possible to trace and list all their ships passing through the canal.

There is still much to be done. There are many gaps to be filled and it is hoped that fellow postal historians will help with details from their own collections and from their own studies. In this way a comprehensive study of this important region can be undertaken and a fairly complete work published.

Hill & Raven appear to have been in business conveying tourists and any freight they could get before Waghorn arrived. Not much seems to be known about them, but they appear to have been generally more business-like but very much less picturesque. Significantly, when in 1836 the Bombay Steam Committee applied one million rupees for the improvement of the Overland Route, the money went to Hill & Raven who built the Rest-houses on the Desert Route from Cairo to Suez. There is a tendency for writers about Waghorn to say that in 1841 Waghorn went into partnership with them, or even admitted them to partnership; but as the firm was called J.R.Hill & Co. that suggests that Devine in 'Those Splendid Ships', page 80, is nearer the mark in saying that Waghorn was swallowed by Hill & Raven.

Towards the end of 1840 Waghorn is getting rather shrill about them:-

"Alexandria 22 Sept 1840

"Captain Grindlay sends all his people to Hills the consequence is confusion propounded* in fact a mixture of usefulness and uselessness which (abrogates ? / militates ?)** against the company's interest and our own."

* another Waghorn neologism (or Malapropism). ** an indication of the difficulty of Waghorn's writing under stress; it could be either, if either made any sense; perhaps yet another neologism).

"Alexandria 17th Octobr 1840

" . . . every passengers pr Oriental thro us passed on to India but not one which went by Hill & Co.

. . . The Pasha has ordered <u>Hills</u> carriages not to run and has shut up his hotel.

"14 Nov 40

"Here is an inclosure respecting the annoyances of Hill & Raven to Travellers as well as their exorbitant Charges and general insolence, let this be written in very large letters & shewn to every passenger who comes to Egypt.

"Alexa 20 Jan 41

". . . We now beg to tell you that sometimes with (word illegible) all our alacrity & zeal Hill gets on Board the Steamer first & takes away (by bad report) many of the passengers who go to your Office & give their names to us in London.

"Alexa 23rd Feb 1841

"Capt Barker My dear Sir,

I am sorry, very sorry to find that you, as well as Capt Grindlay, recommend Travellers en route to India to go thro Egypt under the agency of Hill & Co instead of under mine. Surely, most surely this kind of usage is not what I had expected from Capt. Barker, & I feel convinced that upon Reflection your general warmness of heart and nature will tell you from conscience that Waghorn ought to be supported through thick and thin by all who hold Steam intercourse a boon to India and the East. In the early days of advocacy of this measure even before your own active zeal and advocacy of Steam were heard of, your friend Waghorn was alone, was laughed at, nay deemed quite an enthusiast & half a madman for talking about mails going in fifty days and Passengers and all over the Great Sandy Desert. That Grindlay should be my enemy I am not surprised at, as I do not believe him to have common honesty enough to be any mans friend -- but you & I, that have sailed and baffled many a squall should be more free, more frank, and more friendly one toward the other. I give you my honor that to the best of my knowledge my Agency is doubly superior to Hill in all points & trebly more respectable. Pray write to Mrs Randell Ward (Archdeacon's wife of Bombay) and say her husbands arrival at Suez on the 10th and waits her arrival in Egypt, & ask that lady if Waghorn's Agency is good or bad & if she did not

. . QUESTION TIME

MEMBERS' REPLIES to Questions put previously

<u>Q. Time 9.</u> Subject: "Automobile" cancel on 1928 Medical issue Question appeared in June 1979 Q.C.

Maj. E.L.G.MacArthur (ESC 125) has kindly drawn attention to an article in L'O. P. number 33 (July 1937) pages 117-121, by Messrs Abdel Gawad El Ghazali and Jean Boulad d'Humieres. This article is entitled "The Commemorative Postmarks of Egypt" and covers from the Alexandria Exhibition of 1894 to the 15th Agricultural & Industrial Exhibition in 1936. The writers make the point that, on the occasion of every Congress, Exhibition or Event which is relevant to their Study, there was a special temporary Post Office, with special Exhibition Datestamp, in the premises occupied by the Event. (An exception to this was the Graf Zeppelin visit, where the special postmarks were applied at the central Post Offices of the four cities visited).

Not all relevant Exhibitions were the subject of a special issue of stamps, and not all commemorative stamps were the subject of Exhibitions (the Port Fouad issue is therefore not covered in the Study).

The writers mention that the special postmarks are met with in different colours, blue and violet being the most frequent, after black.

<u>Q. Time 10.</u> Subject: "Thanks to British Navy" Labels Question appeared in June 1979 Q.C.

Mr Philip Woodland (ESC 161) has kindly supplied a copy of a complete sheet of these labels, and this forms an illustration in this issue. Mr Woodland draws attention to the two staple marks at top left and right, and surmises that these were therefore likely to have been sold in booklets through stationers, etc.

<u>Q. Time 12.</u> Subject: "Mobile Box" cancel Question appeared in Sept 1979 Q.C.

Mr J. Stanley Horesh (ESC 118) has kindly supplied the following information as to how this mark came to be applied. He first assumes that the information as to the card having been written aboard R.M.S. 'INDIA' at Port Said on 9th May 1899 is given on the obverse, and that the details are correct.

To receive a Port Said PAQUEBOT cancel the card would have had to have been offloaded at Port Said. / Continued . . .

Q. Time 12 - continued

The card, therefore, was posted on board after the ship sailed from Port Said, or missed being off-loaded before sailing. It remained on board until the ship arrived at Tilbury when it was put into the Mobile Box on the quayside. Mr Horesh suggests that, as the journey from Port Said to Tilbury would have taken about seven days and the London datestamp is 13th May, the card must either have been written several days after the ship sailed from Port Said, or the writer inscribed the wrong date. One would need to research whether on this voyage R.M.S. 'INDIA' called at other mainland European ports between Port Said and London. If it did call then the card was posted on board after such call.

Mr Horesh has a 1 pi Blue 1884 with the same postmark dated Feb 2 96 which is the earliest date recorded by the late Charles Minett. The last date he recorded was JY 13 02.

<u>Q. Time 14</u> <u>Question appeared Sept 1979 Q.C.</u>

Mr Bill Andrews (ESC 132) has kindly supplied the following information.

" This route ran across the desert at the same time as the Cairo-Baghdad Air Service of the R.A.F. was in operation and about which I have learned quite a lot since my original query.

" Recently I had the good fortune to meet an ex-Squadron Leader R.A.F. who was in Baghdad at the time of both the Desert Air Service and the Overland Route - the early to mid 1920's - and was intimately connected with them both, in a junior capacity of course. He has agreed to a session or two when he will produce all his photographs and other impedimenta and I will try to get all his reminiscences on tape together with his answers to the many questions I have. I shall welcome questions from other ESC Members.

" It is not very often one has the opportunity of meeting somebody who was actually present at these events and I hope to be able to get enough material for an article for the Q.C. in due course.

" Referring back to the <u>DESERT AIR SERVICE</u> I have now managed to acquire six covers, mainly from dealers who had no idea what they were, the most recent being two from Baghdad to Germany dated July 1924 and May 1925 and I find the postage rates most perplexing :-

My two covers - Air Mail - Baghdad to Germany - 6 annas each Another cover of mine 29.9.1923 - Baghdad to U.K. - Air Mail - 12 annas Illustration to Q. Time 14 - Baghdad to Cairo - Overland - 7 annas Keith Tranmer's article* page 1359 1st paragraph - Baghdad to Europe overland - 9 annas.

" These rates do not seem to be consistent !! Any comments ?

" With the Desert Air Service and the Overland Mail my interest has been aroused greatly in a subject I didn't even know existed only a few short months ago."

*Article by Mr Keith Tranmer in "Stamp Collecting Weekly", Vol. 134, No. 12 (3434), 20th September 1979, from page 1357.

Mr Robin Bertram (ESC 137) also drew attention to the article in "Stamp Collecting" by Keith Tranmer and in fact kindly supplied a copy of it.

Mr J. Stanley Horesh (ESC 118) kindly drew attention to an article on "The Overland Route" by the late Dr Gordon Ward which appeared in "The Philatelist" of February 1963.

Mr John Davis (ESC 213) wrote, enclosing the copy Post Card which is illustrated. The card was sent from Port Said on 17th April 1922 to India (too early for the Egypt/Iraq Overland route ?). The 5-mills adhesive attracted the 'Taxe' mark in Egypt but what is to be made of the circular mark at top centre: OVERLAND POSTAGE / DUE / A - P / 1 - 6 ?
