

Massawa, November 11, 1879: Cover, written in the hand of General Charles 'Chinese' Gordon, docketed at top 'No. 323, C.G.' in manuscript addressed to Colonel Harvey of the Royal Engineers, Gibraltar. Massawa 'Maktab Bosta Khedewiya Masriya' negative seal handstamp in black (Egyptian Khedevial Post Office) and 'Poste Khedevie Egiziane / Massawa' datestamps at left. Suez transit (Nov 25) and cover awaited forwarding and mailed with 1879 2pi. orange cancelled at Port Said (Dec 8). Rare.

Report of the Annual General Meeting, King's Head, Marylebone, February 8

PRESENT: John Davis (Chairman/Librarian), Jon Aitchison (Deputy Chairman/Programme Secretary), Mike Murphy (Secretary/Editor), Sami Sadek (Treasurer), Neil Hitchens (Webmaster), Mike Bramwell, John Clarke, Sherif Samra (Egypt).

2019 AGM Minutes were approved: it was noted that the Circle's grant of 650 euros to help with publication of his *Alexandria Postal History* will be presented to Ronny Van Pellecom at London 2020 (*review*, page 4).

<u>Chairman</u>: The Chairman welcomed those present, including especially Dr Sherif Samra from Egypt, and reported on a successful year in 2019. He regretted very much that ill health meant that he had been unable to visit Cairo in September for the 90th Anniversary of the Philatelic Society of Egypt, and congratulated the

auctioneers on a very successful autumn sale which raised considerable funds for the family of Peter Andrews.

<u>Auction</u>: Mike Murphy restated his standing down as Auctioneer after some 25 years in the post, and said that the continuing challenges, though delightful and distracting, called for a rethink of past practice. He was happy to go out on a high note, raising some £14,000 for the Andrews family with the room sale in November. A new Auctioneer is sought (*see right*). He reported that 35 of 43 email bidders were successful, winning a total of 148 lots, while in the room ten bidders took 106 lots, outbidding email bids 57 times and buying 47 lots that had no email bids.

A combination of vastly increased PayPal fees and higher postal rates left the Circle facing a critical shortfall from 24 of the 35 email bidders, with net-paid totals failing to meet the invoiced bid-plus-commission total. He recommended that the long-standing practice of commission covering PayPal fee

plus postage was simply no longer sufficient and must be abandoned.

Auctioneer required

Wanted urgently: any member willing to take on the crucially important role of Auctioneer. Our two auctions a year provide much of our cash-flow; and new ideas and new thinking are required. The new face in the role, who should preferably, though not necessarily, live in or near London, will be given every help. But what we need is someone who will face the challenge and do it his way...

Emails to egyptstudycircle@hotmail.com will receive replies with alacrity.

After a great deal of discussion, it was agreed unanimously (proposed Jon Aitchison, seconded John Davis) that all future Auction and annual subscription payments by PayPal would attract a 5% surcharge. Auction invoices will also include an estimated charge for postage and packing to be paid by the winning bidder. The PayPal 5% will of course not apply to those paying by cheque or bank transfer; and the present Auction commissions (10% buyer, 5% seller) will not be affected.

Notice was given that a postal/room auction will be held at our joint meeting with the Sudan Study Group in Derby in April: each group will submit some 170 lots to email bidding, which will then be finally decided in the room, with - exceptionally in this special one-off case – members of each society able to bid on the other's lots. This most unusual decision was accepted unanimously. The meeting then voted with acclaim in favour of a proposal by Peter Grech, seconded by John Davis: "On behalf of all ESC Members, a very special Thank You to Mike Murphy for his outstanding achievements as ESC Auctioneer for the past 25 years, in addition to his other duties as Secretary, and more recently as Editor, all performed so efficiently and gallantly".

Accounts: The Treasurer noted that because of our very early AGM date the Accounts had not yet been finalised, but that the Circle was now £35,000 in credit compared with £27,000 at the end of the previous year. It was agreed to make specific among the Circle's assets that our New Issues stamp collection should be valued at £500 and the Library at £2,000.

<u>Secretary:</u> The Secretary reported that membership had stayed constant at 165 during the year, including the advent of two new members and restoration of a third, and was given approval to accept new members if there was a long gap until the next meeting. He again lamented the poor response to voting for the MacArthur Award, despite more intense publicity, and the Chairman was pleased to be able to hand the statuette to the winner, Sami Sadek, for his innovative work on combining TPO postmarks with rail timetables to reveal the precise route and timing of covers via their backstamps.

Meetings: The Programme Secretary reviewed an exciting year, with local meetings and others further afield, including Derby (an initial joint meeting with the Sudan Study Group), Stockholm, Cairo and finally, in early December, a massive meeting in Monte Carlo highlighting the best exhibition of Egypt material ever seen (*see page 5*): the Circle dinner in Monaco was attended by some 20 members and guests. The Programme Secretary looked forward to more international meetings as providing a social and exhibiting facility for overseas members, who form 70 per cent of our membership. Sami Sadek proposed (seconded Jon Aitchison) a vote of thanks to Hany Salam, prime mover behind the Monaco exhibition, for helping to bring knowledge of Egypt and its stamps to a new range of newcomers. There was much discussion about local venues and their costs, the meeting finally favouring the Victory Services Club over the King's Head by five votes to one with two abstentions. In future we shall plan to have two meetings a year at Stampex, one in Derby and two at the VSC.

<u>Editor</u>: The Editor noted that *QC*s were being produced on time despite his inexperience, and thanked regular contributors for their patience and continuing supply of fascinating material, while suggesting (gently) that all articles would be gratefully received, but that those of 2-4 pages would be most easily dealt with.

<u>Website:</u> The Webmaster reported that his experiments with digitising old copies of the *QC* and *L'OP* had been successful, and cost-free, so we hope that more will soon be available online. He mentioned several recent design improvements, and forecast that many more would be forthcoming as we move towards a more user-friendly design with added features now that the present site has been completely understood and appreciated.

<u>Library</u>: The Librarian reported that he had brought two books with him for a member to borrow, but even though the Library had expanded beyond its floor-to-ceiling cupboard over the past 40 years, two others requested were not found among them. He is working on a new list of books available, which will be too big for the *QC* but will be posted on the website.

Any other Business: It was decided that the November meeting would be a room auction at the Victory Services Club (November 14); and that the 2021 AGM will take place in July at the VSC. Date to be arranged.

There then followed a meeting on postcards, including a bizarre, even morbid, display of anonymous cards by Mike Murphy on the Denshawai Incident of 1906, the spark that lit Egyptian nationalism after a fracas between villagers in Menufieh and British officers out pigeon shooting left one officer dead. The cards show the villagers being tried, hanged and flogged – unbelievable by today's standards, but propaganda proof of British rule in Egypt. John Davis showed a remarkable series of cards of Napoleon and French influence in Egypt; and Jon Aitchison a display of printed advertising postcards, mainly concerned with advances in engineering.



Book Review: ALEXANDRIA - Postal History until 1918 - Part 1, by Ronny Van Pellecom

Ronny Van Pellecom, with whom I had the pleasure of collaborating on the book *Ramleh-Alexandrie* (2010), has become renowned in philatelic circles for his thorough, keen and persistent research into postal history, spanning many countries to acquire information from various archives, libraries and organisations. Currently, with Alain Stragier, he is running a series of articles in the ESC *Quarterly Circular* on Egyptian *Railway Stations during 1879-1914*. His latest outstanding offering is this Postal History of Alexandria, a city which has always fascinated him and which he has frequently visited for his investigations.

In what is intended as a two-part study, this first volume deals with mail since ancient Roman times, through to 1914 in the city proper, as it evolved. The second volume, to come, will cover the districts of Alexandria (harbour, stations, Mariout), as well as the railway to Rosetta, and the impact of World War I on the area. This Part 1 relates the origins of correspondence to/from Alexandria since antiquity, through the Venetian Mail and letters forwarded by ship captains, on to Napoleon's Egyptian Campaign, 1798-1801, and its postal markings.



There follows the Posta Europea, and then the Foreign Consular Post Offices: Greek, French, Austrian, British, Russian and Italian. Each is dealt with in great detail, indicating its location, organisation and means of corresponding. There are no long dissertations; instead, in his own individual style, Ronny concentrates on illustrations of postmarks, letters, postcards, newspaper cuttings, biographical notes, official documents and maps to tell the stories. I am particularly gratified in that he has retained for the French P.O. the postmark numbering system which I introduced in my *French Post Offices in Egypt* (2012). For each Consular office there is an item to illustrate the use of virtually every postmark, and mixed frankings are included as well. All this makes for an extremely pleasurable visual experience. Minor factual or date inaccuracies which exist are dwarfed by the overall magnitude of the work. At the end of each chapter there is an extensive *Literature* list, acknowledging past researchers and listing their related works for reference and further reading.

The book itself is beautifully produced, its 296 all colour pages being very well printed on fine quality paper, between two sturdy illustrated hard covers. The Egypt Study Circle awarded Ronny a €650 grant towards the publication cost of this work, and it has been well repaid. Whether you are specifically interested in the subject matter or not, this is an attractive and informative book which will grace any philatelic library.

Nearly all the second half of this volume is dedicated to the Egyptian State Post and is really spectacular in its dealing with regular and auxiliary postmarks (registration, taxation, instructional markings), again with related fine covers or postcards. Contemporary events of various periods are included, such as the Egyptian National Exhibition, 1894, and the wreck of the steamship *Cairo*, 1905, on the approaches to the harbour. The Egyptian Postal Rates are fully displayed and various maps indicate the location of the Alexandria P.O. over time. Being the main topic, the latter is dealt with extensively, and there are pictures of buildings, mail box types, official notices, etc. One of my favourites is the *Catalogue des Meubles*, 1906, showing the schematic for the construction of standard Egyptian post office counters and furniture at the time; a good example of the depth of meticulous research Ronny has gone into. The book is a real tour-de-force, and the author should be warmly congratulated. Strongly recommended.

Egypt stuns the world in Monaco

Those members of the Egypt Study Circle and the Philatelic Society of Egypt lucky enough to be able to spend four days in Monte Carlo in November are still trying to catch their breath after attending what has undoubtedly been the most comprehensive exhibition of Egyptian philately ever produced. As a crucial part of its regular

celebration, the Club de Monte-Carlo used Monacophil 2019 to present in 209 frames pretty well every philatelic treasure Egypt has produced.

The non-competitive exhibition, Treasures of Egypt, was graced by the patronage of Prince Albert II of Monaco and by the presence of ex-King Ahmed Fouad of Egypt, son of King Farouk, who showed enormous interest in examining many of the most significant exhibits from his native land.

The Egypt exhibition, which ran alongside a similar display of Maritime material, was a personal triumph for Hany Salam of the PSE (ESC 580), who as a member of the Club de Monte-Carlo has lobbied for years for an Egypt presentation that would place before the eyes of the world the relevance and

importance of Egyptian philately. As a double string to his bow, he was also able to launch his new publication, *The Egyptian Maritime Postal History, 1845-1889*, which was received with delight.

In all, 24 members of the Circle -18 of them from Egypt itself - showed 138 frames detailing virtually every highlight of Egyptian philately, as well as significant literature. They were joined in exhibiting by 12 internationally acclaimed philatelists who have long recognised the very special appeal in Egypt and its stamps.

Monacophil is a biannual non-competitive philatelic event hosted by the Club de Monte-Carlo. The 2019 event had two main themes, in addition to a young philatelist exhibition: one was the Treasures of Egypt and the second was Maritime postal history.

These were held on the Terrasses de Fontvieille, the venue that hosts Prince Albert's personal and extensive antique motor vehicle collection, which includes a 1903 De Dion Bouton. Just opposite was the Musée de Timbres et des Monnaies, where the Club set up an overwhelming special exhibition of the 100 world's most

significant stamps and documents. Among the exhibitors was Her Majesty the Queen, Prince Albert himself, and Hany Salam. What an honour! Hany, the main driver behind the special Egyptian presentation, with the strong support of Patrick Maselis, president of the Club de Monte-Carlo, and Sherif Samra, was rightly praised for his organisational skills.

The Egypt exhibition reflected the outstanding contribution of Egypt to international philately and provided a superb historical background to its wealth and complexity. Hany Salam acted as host and guide to Prince Albert and ex-King Ahmed Fouad on an extended tour of the frames, and the former king, accompanied by his daughter, Princess Fawzia Latifa, graciously agreed afterwards to meet the Egyptian exhibitors, many of whom gave him personal philatelic gifts.

The Princess returned on the final day for another look back at Egypt's history in stamps. Both were very

friendly and approachable, involved for at least two hours talking to our members and posing for photographs.

The exhibition involved many of the giants of Egyptian philately, with so many rare and stunning presentations that it would be impossible to discuss them all. So a few highlights will be mentioned to provide an idea of the outstanding quality of exhibits.

Joe Chalhoub presented Treasures from the Royal Collection, with the 1948 Farouk Military issue 50 piastres displayed both as an imperforate blue frame colour trial and full imperforate sheet. In addition, he showed a stunning complete seven sheets of proofs of the First Issue.

Greg Todd presented his unsurpassed collection of the First Issue including the renowned block of 53 of the 1pi. Yasser Omar showed a detailed Fouad First Portrait exhibit including proofs and the largest imperforate block of 21 of the 200 mills. Atef Sarian presented an incredible collection of the King Farouk Military issue including many rarities.

Sami Fereig and Sherif Samra were granted a private meeting with ex-King Ahmed Fouad, and presented him with a copy of Professor Fereig's three-volume tour de force of the Postal History of Egypt. The former monarch spent a significant amount of time and interest in examining the books.

The event was also a wonderful opportunity to socialise. Without doubt the highlight was the Gala Dinner in the Imperial Salon of the Hotel de Paris. To our surprise as we entered we saw that the room had taken a step back in history, with a sarcophagus, Tutankhamun effigy and the walls of the sumptuous dining room completely covered with huge screens designed to echo Ancient Egyptian tomb themes.

Among the other social and philatelic events was the presentation by David Feldman of the series of books based on Joe Chalhoub's specialised collection. The Monaco Post Office produced a stamp and an Egypt-themed miniature sheet on which one stamp depicts the Great Pyramid at Giza.

Report of the Nov 7 meeting – Egypt Hotels: Almost a dozen members attended a fascinating exhibition by Richard Wheatley (ESC 168) on November 7 at the comfortable and efficient new HQ of the Royal Philatelic Society of London, a short walk from both Bank and Cannon Street Underground stations. The meeting was one of a series marking 150 years of the Royal.

Richard explained that he was able to show only a small part of his steadily expanding Hotels collection, but surprised both Egypt collectors and a wider audience with the depth and breadth of his

research. Contrary to earlier ESC belief, he pointed out, these offices were staffed by regular Post Office staff who applied each season to work at a particular hotel.


To accompany the presentation, he showed a wide selection of covers from each of the hotels that operated the service, illustrating the many cancellations in use: he is working hard on recalibrating the accepted Study Circle numbering and listing of these postmarks so that their order more closely accords with more recent discoveries of dates of use. Richard appropriately donned a tarbush to receive the Royal's 150th Anniversary Medal from its recently elected President, Richard Stock.

ADDENDUM to "1910 - Heliopolis - Grande Semaine d'Aviation"


Since the 2010 first edition of my book on the 1910 Heliopolis Air Meeting, a number of readers have kindly provided further illustrations of ephemera and postcards omitted originally, since they were not known to me at the time. These new discoveries are included in this article, together with better quality illustrations of some items (*marked as "REPLACEMENT"*) and corrections to minor errata. For this additional material I am indebted particularly to Mr Jean-Marie Delelis (France, ESC 575), Mr Hani Sharestan (USA, ESC 595) and Mr Anders Bruun (Sweden), of the International Plastic Modellers Society. Also to the Roumet auction house in Paris for some of the illustrations. My grateful thanks to all for their contribution.

Due to personal reasons it is very unlikely that there shall be a second edition, so this Addendum is taking the form of an 8-page central insert in this QC, which can be pulled out and kept with the original book. 






FORGERY of the "HELIOPOLIS AERODRÔME" Postmark.




In Part 2 of the book, page 38, Jean Boulad d'Humières described a very dangerous forgery of the sought after "Heliopolis Aerodrôme" postmark only used at the Meeting, for just eight days. One such was illustrated there and now here is another. They both originated from the same forger and have a date of 6.II.10. 350P.M. Both were addressed to the Shepheards Hotel, misspelt. This card illustrates the Gastambide and Mengin aeroplane; the fake message reports that Mengin flew well; signed Gastambide! Neither that plane nor that pilot took part at the Heliopolis meeting.

Of the differences in Arabic lettering between the genuine and the forged postmarks here, the most significant one is the size of the loop of the letter TAH in the lower half, under the dateline.

<u>Note</u>: The Meeting's postmark is not only known on commemorative air cards, but as demonstrated by the Oranotypie cards, many spectators brought their own cards, with traditional views of Egypt (such as camels, jugglers, caravans, etc.). For philatelic purposes, the postmark is also known cancelling stamps on some blank envelopes which did not travel.

ERRATUM: On page 20 of the Heliopolis Air Meeting book, it is not a Farman aeroplane in the lower illustration, but it is a Voisin Biplane, flown by Henry Farman!





PORT-SAID – ISMAILIA

The postal service between Ismailia and Port-Said was made possible by a small steamboat which left daily at about 6am from Ismailia, after the arrival of the train from Cairo. In addition, every two days a larger and more comfortable vessel owned by the Suez Canal Company left at 7.30 in the morning (*Isambert 1878*)

This steamer service ended on 3 December 1893 when the Canal Company started a steam tramway service on a narrow-gauge track and the three Government postal boats used between Ismailia and Port Said were taken out of service.

The narrow gauge was rebuilt into a standard gauge in 1902 and in the same year the Egyptian Government took over the railway line.




ISMAILIA

The city was created during the construction of the Suez Canal, of which it stands approximately at the centre. Its population, which tends to decrease for a few years, is composed chiefly of employees of the administration of the canal, together with representatives of agricultural companies, European merchants and local people.

The foundation stone was laid on April 24 1862, at which time the name of the town was Timsah. It was changed to Ismailia in honour of Khedive Ismail on 6 March 1863. (*QC* 17)



Opening of the canal: Festival at Ismailia (The Illustrated London News, 18 December 1869)




Ismailia in 1869 (Carte de l'Isthme de Suez et plans des villes Port-Said, Ismailia & Suez 1869)


The railway connection to Cairo via Zagazig was opened in 1868. Opening of the railway line to Suez using the branch line via Nifisha came the following year.









A Postal History of Egypt under the Muhammad Ali Dynasty

Full colour four-volume series by Sami M. Fereig







This set of three books details the history of the Muhammad Ali Dynasty and Egyptian philately. It closes a major gap in the literature, since no other book comes close to the coverage of this set. Its novel perspective on Egypt's history and philatelic development is a unique contribution to Egypt's postal history.

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Book 2: Vol. 3: Post Office cancellations in the 19th Century and the spread of Egypt's post offices at home and abroad are documented from 1866 to 1914. Also included are Egypt's Travelling and Rural post offices, and its offices on the Red Sea. Many examples of these cancellations are given throughout the book.

Book 3: Vol. 4: The first commemorative stamp was issued in 1925 to mark the International Geographical Conference in Cairo, followed by over 225 other such issues. This book documents all of these Commemorative Issues up to January 1966, which was the centenary of the first Egyptian postage stamp.
