## Intaglio Seal Cancelling Devices in the Egyptian Postal Museum, Cairo

In May of 1980, while on a trip to Egypt, Peter R. Feltus and Charles F. Hass were permitted to examine the contents of two display cases in the Egyptian Postal Museum, Cairo. Within the two cases are kept the various cancelling devices employed at Egyptian post offices over the past 100-odd years. They range from the period of the Posta Europea (represented by several devices) up to the early 1950's. Included in the group are some of the devices used at Egyptian post offices abroad, such as GEDDA and COSTANTINOPOLI. The assembly is by no means complete, as many known devices are missing. All the same, there is a wealth of knowledge to be gained from a careful study of the contents of the cases.

Although we were not permitted to make impressions of the cancellers on our own paper, we were priviledged to be permitted to spend some time in the examination of them, and we did attempt to make some notes regarding what we saw.

Included in the contents of one of the display cases is a group of four red books, the pages of which contain many, rather poorly struck impressions of the devices housed in the cases. In studying these books, I made some notations regarding the intaglio seals represented in the group. There are eighteen seals present, only one of which I have seen before! Although I am not a scholar of this particular facet of Egyptian philately, it would seem worthwhile to me at this point to communicate what I have seen to those who are better qualified that I to sort out what is unusual among the group. What follows is a list detailing the various cancels with respect to what is represented in the Postal Marking Data Sheets (Egyptian Postal Markings of 1865 through 1879, E.S.C. Study VI). All of the im-pressions fall under the classification "Seal-RA2" (page 26), with the exception of one seal of ATFE, which is completely different from anything yet recorded. The RA2 classification is further broken down with respect to the four (actually two ) sub-types illustrated in the Data Sheets (ETLIDEM, MAHALLET ABOU ALY and SAMANOUD are quite similar to one another, and the poor quality of the strikes that I observed makes it difficult, if not impossible, to pinpoint which of the three any one of the seals observed by me most closely resembles). For the sake of simplicity, I shall use EL HAWARIA and SAMANOUD as comparable forms in the list that follows. Those two offices, along with ETLIDEM and MAHALLET ABOU ALY, are illustrated below (MAHALLET ABOU ALY is incomplete).

I have no idea as to the dates of usage of any of the seals described above, and many of them may very well date from the twentieth century. There were no dates on the pages from which they were taken that would indicate the answer to any question of their respective periods of employment. There is also no sure way to tell if indeed they were <u>ever</u> used on mail (with the exception of the EL HAWARIA, which has already been recorded on cover).

The one important result of our being allowed to examine these devices is the rekindling of interest in the study of the postal markings of Egypt. We now know that there is much that we do not know, locked up in the facilities of the Egyptian Postal Museum. It is unfortunate that there seems to be no appreciation among philatelists in Egypt for what lies at their very fingertips, as it has taken all these years for any of us to get a true picture of just what can be available to the concientious philatelist, if only he has the desire to make an effort to gain access to such a wealth of knowledge. Many of us have been struggling for years to get a total, overall picture of the entire spectrum of postal markings, all the while not realizing that many of our questions could have been easily answered by a trip to the Egyptian Postal Museum. After all, what is the purpose of a museum, if not to preserve and propagate the knowledge of all that lies protected within its walls? It is hoped that officials in Cairo will realize that a spirit of cooperation with responsible philatelists wishing to study in detail the material kept in the Museum can only be beneficial to Egypt.

#### 1962 DAG HAMMARSKJOLD Issue - by D. Carew (ESC 193)

On 24 October 1962 a commemorative series for the 17th anniversary of the United Nations, depicting Dag Hammarskjold with U.N. emblem, was issued. Three values were issued (5, 10 and 35 milliemes) for the United Arab <sup>R</sup>epublic and also for Gaza, in sheets of 50 ( $5 \ge 10$ ).

On all the values the vignette plate depicting the head and neck of Dag Hammarskjold was printed in a very deep slate blue approaching black. There were two different plates used on the stamps of United Arab Republic. Two more plates were used for Gaza which included the additional PALESTINE and equivalent Arabic inscriptions. It is important to realise that the plates used for Gaza were not the same as the plates used for United Arabic Republic but had different flaws in and around the head and neck.

The frame or duty plate was printed in different colours for each of the three values. Colours used for United ArabRepublic and Gaza were different:-

For each value two different frame plates are known. The plates used for United Arab Republic and for Gaza are the same; identical flaws occur on each.

NOTE: 'Left' eye, cheek, collar, etc. refers to that which is shown on the left side of the stamp as looked at by the observer. More varieties are listed with some plates than others simply because the author has been able to check these more extensively. Only in very few instances have varieties been listed when only one pane or block has been examined. (The scratch varieties on frame plate B on stamps 25, 30, 34, 35 are such an instance).

#### MARGINAL MARKINGS

Printers' markings in the margins can distinguish upper and lower panes. Lower panes have a diagonal line of colour of the frame plate followed by a horizontal line of colour of the frame plate and then a horizontal line of colour of the vignette plate. The tip of the horizontal line is 34mm above the right border of stamp 2. The horizontal lines are about 40mm above stamp 3 and possibly stamp 4. Upper panes have the diagonal line and horizontal lines showing under stamps 48 and possibly 49. The tip of the diagonal line is 34mm below stamp 48 vertically below about 8mm from left border. (See illustration).

The date of printing is given in the pane margin just to the right of stamp 5, e.g. 10 X 62, digits of which extend over 11mm. Each digit is 2mm tall. Sheet numbers consist of five figures 3mm tall, the first of which is usually to the right of stamp 25 and the other four to the right of stamp 20; occasionally the last digit is right of stamp 15. The five numbers extend over a distance of 30mm. The overall distance between sheet number and date of printing is 105mm. The shape, size and position of the digits suggest that one machine was used to print the black type on all panes.

## SCARCITY

Zeheri 9th edition states that 600,000 sets for U.A.R. and 142,373 sets for Gaza were issued. Of the issued sheets of 50 analysis shows it is fair to assume that half were upper and half were lower panes. So a variety occurring on a vignette plate would occur on 6,000 sets of U.A.R. or 1,423 sets of Gaza (each value would have the variety that number of times). A variety occuring on a frame plate would occur on 6,000 sets of U.A.R. and 1,423 sets of Gaza.

#### CONSTANT VARIETIES, 1925 GEOGRAPHICAL SET, 5-mills value - Themis Dacos (ESC 220)

One would think that such an old issue as the 1925 Geographical would have been studied thoroughly during so many years. But - you never know !

A full sheet of the 5-mills value came into my possession some time ago. This was an excellent opportunity for study which finally revealed some varieties. They are constant varieties, as I had the chance to verify later, by looking through a stock of detached pieces. I report the two more spectacular varieties.

1. The 2nd stamp of the sheet shows the letters 'M' and 'E' of the word 'ROYAUME' connected by a white line.

2. The 76th stamp of the sheet shows the second letter 'I' of the word 'INTERNATIONAL' cut in the middle, like a semi-colon punctuation mark.

YET ANOTHER FAKED COVER - J. Boulad d'Humieres (ESC 16)

In the course of the reunion of Members of the Egypt Study Circle on 7th May 1980 at the 'London 1980' Exhibition, I presented and commented upon the cover and contents reproduced here. (See illustration - Editor)

I believe it will be interesting and useful to repeat my comments in the 'Q.C.' for the benefit of philatelists who were unable to attend the Exhibition reunion.

This letter would be a unique item, if it were not a gross fake. It was offered for sale in 1979 by a big dealer in London to a collector in Geneva who, on examining it, had doubts about its authenticity. He and I studied it with care and we quickly concluded that it was a gross fakery.

It began life as a letter sent from ZIFTA on 23rd July 1867 to Gairo, franked one plastre by a bisected 2-plastre yellow of the 1866 issue.

If the postage stamp itself is genuine, all the rest is 'manufactured'.

Following the exhaustion of 1-piastre stamps at the Post Offices in Alexandria and Cairo, and while awaiting the 2nd issue being put on sale on 1st August 1867, the Postal Administration, by their Circulars numbers 167, 168, of 13th July 1867 and number 1703 of 19th July 1867, authorised the use of bisected 2-piastre stamps at Alexandria, from 16th to 31st July 1867, and at Cairo from 20th to 31st July.

The datestamps of Alexandria are always struck in black, on such bisected stamps, whereas the strikes of Cairo are always in blue.

No other town was within this exceptional authorisation, having normally good supplies of the 1-piastre stamps.

In the case of this letter, the date stamp of 'ZIFTA & MITG', struck in black on 23rd July 1867, is a forgery and that of the arrival - or transit - of 'BIRKET EL SAB' is equally a forgery.

There is no arrival datestamp of Cairo on the reverse.

The Cairo destination is clearly legible, in Arabic, at the top of the front of the cover.

Furthermore, the letter is dated 25th July 1867 in the Arabic text !!

The two datestamps are of Type I-2-5n, in the official listing of the Egypt Study Circle, Study VI.

Finally, the content of the address, and of the text of the letter, is incomprehensible; it is an extraordinary fantasy. It approaches the faked letters reported and reproduced in L'Orient Philatelique, No. 125, April 1972, pp 95-97.

In the 'Q.C.' number 113 - Volume X, No. 9 - on page 269 there is reproduced a franked letter sent from PALAIS D'ABDINE in 1952, submitted by Mr C.E.H.Derfiez (ESC 172).

In this connection, I remember having read somewhere in the Q.C\* that a Study of the successive postal markings of the different Post Offices at the Royal Palaces would certainly be interesting to undertake.

To make a start, if this is the 'departure point' for this Study, I am happy to present here three different postal markings. (See illustrations - Editor).

(1) "QUBBA PALACE 20,1.38"

This mark is on a Registered Letter which I had addressed to myself on the same day as the marriage contract of King Farouk was signed, on 20th January 1938, at 11 a.m. This cover constitutes a First Day Cover.

A point to notice is the different forms of the latin characters: in English on the datestamp, and in French "PALAIS DE KOUBBA" on the Registration cachet.

(2) "PALAIS RAS EL TIN 1 JL 39"

This mark, from Alexandria, appears on an ordinary letter, self-addressed to me.

(3) "PALAIS D'ABDINE / R, P. 16 NO 48"

This appears on a First Day Cover of stamps commemorating Ibrahim Pasha.

I hope that this lettle report will encourage other researchers to continue this listing and to report items which they possess.
